CLOSES AGENCY.

German Insurance Company Retires from Pacific Coast Business.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 23 .- The Examiner today says:

The German insurance company after sounding a number of creditors on the subject of a 50 per cent compromise, has closed its Pacific Coast agency, resigned from the underwriters adjusting bureau and retired to Peoria, Ill.

The German of Peoria was organized under the laws of Illinois in 1878, with a capital of \$200,000. Now that the San Francisco conflagration has come and gone the company has a loss of over SEATTLE, Wash., June 23 .- Thomas \$1,000,000 to pay, with a capital and surplus aggregating only \$360,000.
