Issues Restraining Order.

Dallas, Tex., June 26.-Judge Andrew P. McCormick, of the United States Circuit Court, yesterday published an order restraining the railroad commission of Texas from enforcing its order promulgated May 30, to reduce passenger fares on the Houston & Texas Central Railroad from 3 cents a mile to 2h cents. The restraining order will hold good until July 16, when the complainint's petition for temporary injunction will be heard. The railroad company further asks that until a full hearing in the case all of the commission's rates, both freight and passenger, shall be perpetually enjoined.
