Ranch eggs are not coming in sufficiently to meet requirements, but the light receipts are being augmented by the Eastern goods. that sell side by side with the local eggs. No Portland storage eggs are being withdrawn, as far as could be learned.

Butter is firmer, though there are still very heavy receipts from usual sources of supply, and some from quarters news to this trade previous to this year.
