be committed for contempt of court. "She may refuse to answer questions on the ground that her answers might tend to degrade or incriminate her and also she has the right to refuse to answer questions on the ground that the answers might tend to convict her of crime.

It is also understood that Mrs. Thaw told her husband when he called upon him in the Tombs yesterday that she would obey the subpoena of the grand jury so far as calling at the grand jury room was concerned, but that under no circumstances would she permit anybody to question her, and that if the Acting District Attorney insisted on putting questions to her she would positively refuse to make any reply to them.

The legal question of what testimony a wife may or may not give against her husband is important in Thaw's case. Under the old common law a wife could not be compelled to give any evidence against her husband but the revised penal code of the State of New York, modified this absolute barrier. Section 715 provides as follows:

"The husband or wife of a person indicted or accused of a crime is in all cases a competent witness on the examination or trial of such person; but neither husband nor wife can be called to disclose a confidential communication made by one to the other during the marriage.

At the proceedings in the grand jury room are secret no announcement of the testimony in today's examination is expected.

Only witnesses sufficient to establish the fact of a crime and who committed it will be called, the district attorney's office not wishing to disclose its whole hand, either at the inquest or in grand jury inquiry.

The district attorney's office completed the examination of the more important witnesses so far discovered yesterday and it directed its attention to the investigation of the relations existing between Evelyn Nesbit and Stanford White prior to the girl's marriage and the attitude assumed by Thaw after he had made her his wife.

"I am investigating every story regarding the life and dissipations of the parties to the tragedy," Mr. Nott said. "There are many of them. I get a new tale every minute and so far neither the police nor the force of this office has been able to substantiate one of them.

"The report that White made an insulting remark about Mrs. Thaw on the night of the shooting, which was overheard by her husband is groundless, so far as I have been able to learn.

"I am perfectly satisfied that nothing that happened Monday night had anything to do with the shooting. The deed was planned before ten. That White talked about Mrs. Thaw after her marriage is heard on all sides, but I have been unable to run down a single specific instance in which her name was mentioned by him in a derogatory manner. I never knew of a case in which there were so many rumors which were without a grain of truth.

Mrs. Thaw seems to be living on the excitement of the moment. It is said at the Lorraine, where she is staying that she sleeps little and every possible moment of her time has, so far, been taken up with consultations with her friends and with the lawyers employed by her husband. She looked even more careworn yesterday than on the day before.

There was an interesting incident in Thaw's interview with the alienists, who called on him to examine him. After some trivial conversation he turned to Dr. Hamilton and asked:

"Doctor, will you prescribe a cigar?" "Yes," answered Dr. Hamilton, handing him one. He lit it, took a few deep puffs, and then looked at Dr. MacDonald and exclaimed:

"I suppose you are too wise to smoke too much?" "I try to do such things in moderation," returned Mr. MacDonald.

## OBJECT TO SO MUCH PUBLICITY

### NEW YORK LIFE INSURANCE COMPANY'S OFFICIALS OPPOSE PUBLISHING POLICYHOLDERS NAMES

NEW YORK, June 28.—General McIntosh, Solicitor of the New York Life Insurance Company, sent to Samuel Untermyer, counsel for the International Policyholders Committee, yesterday, a reply to Mr. Untermyer's letter asking that the committee be allowed at its own expense, to obtain the stenciled lists of New York Life policyholders, when the company has them published. Mr. McIntosh flatly refused to accede to the suggestion.

The New York Life's solicitor declares that his company will strictly comply with all the features of the late legislation, by filing with the superintendent of insurance at the home office and in each of the states and territories and countries where the company does business, two lists of policyholders, but adds to do more than thus comply with the law would be as unjustifiable as failing to comply with it.

He argues at length that it is unwise to have any publicity given to the lists, saying that the publication under the law, which the Armstrong committee got passed will be against the will of a "Very large number" of policyholders who are deemed to consider the fact of their insurance in the New York Life a "confidential contract relation," some on account of "Family reasons," some for "Financial reasons," and still others because of "Natural secretiveness."

The trustees of the Mutual Life Insurance Company held a meeting yesterday and received what is believed to be the final report of the Triestdale investigating committee. The report will be distributed to them by mail. It was not made public. The resignations of trustees Oliphant, Miller and Holden, formerly the committee on expenditures, were accepted.

### FOURTEEN YEARS IN LITIGATION.

#### New York Supreme Court Gives Decision Affecting Northwest Mines.

SEATTLE, June 28.—Fred Williams, one of the best known mining men in the Pacific Northwest, yesterday received telegraphic advices from New York, to the effect that the Supreme Court of that state has handed down a decision in the famous case involving the mining property known as the pride of the Mountains, located in the Monte Cristo district, Snohomish county, which has been before the courts for fourteen years. The decision of the court finds for the plaintiffs, of whom Mr. Williams is one in the sum of \$175,000.

The Pride of the Mountains mine was sold by the late Hiram G. Bond, William brothers and Edward Blewett, to Colgate Hoyt and Charles L. Colby, who were the agents of John D. Rockefeller, and the suit was brought against Colby as such agent. The consideration was to be \$350,000 of which \$175,000 was paid in cash and the balance was to be paid out of the proceeds of the mine or by the purchasers; in the event of the \$175,000 remaining unpaid after a certain period the property was to revert to the original owners, plaintiffs in the suit.

More than 150,000 tons of ore, which yielded returns of from \$10 to \$20 a ton in gold, silver, copper and arsenic were taken out.

The Rockefeller interests were represented by W. L. Guthrie, the eminent corporation lawyer, while the plaintiffs were represented by Andrew F. Burleigh, formerly of Seattle, George H. Harriman, a cousin to E. H. Harriman, and J. Markham Marshall.

During that period, it was said, Mr. White paid to the company \$90,000 in premiums. All of the policies were made payable to his wife.

Mr. White was heavily insured in other companies as well.

None of the Equitable policies had been taken out recently, so far as could be learned.
