Serious Accident.—News reached this city via the steamer Telegraph yesterday afternoon, of a serious accident that happened early in the morning at the second camp of the Willamette Pulp & Paper Company, several miles north of Skamokawa, in which two men were killed and one gravely injured, by the flood gate at one of the dams on Gray's river getting away from them on the rise, and breaking loose, carrying them down with it and crushing them. Their names could not be ascertained, owing to the distance from the scene of the break.

The Legal Limit.—Yesterday was the last day, under the law, for the redemption of the property affected, from the judgment attained, of record, by Mrs. Sarah J. Nickerson vs. D. H. Welch, et al, covering the following property in Shively's Astoria, lots 5 and 6, in block 130; and the water frontage of lots 3 and 4, block 148, and lots 5 and 6, block 127; and D. H. Welch, for himself and his colleagues, paid into the hands of Sheriff Pomeroy the full sum of \$3,045.25, in abatement and satisfaction of said judgment and interest from date of same.

Several New Officers.—Sheriff M. R. Pomeroy, County Treasurer W. A. Sherman, County Commissioner C. C. Maaten, John Sayre, constable, were the new county officers to assume their duties yesterday, and in the school district, City Superintendent A. L. Clark took over the duties and emoluments of the office of school clerk, heretofore filled by E. Z. Ferguson. All were well at last accounts. The old boys were at their several posts as usual, and appeared to be convalescent.

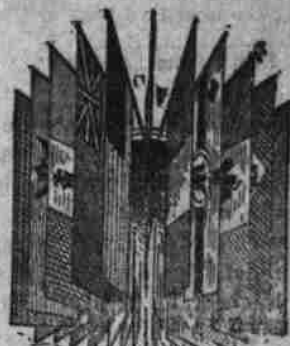
