PORTLAND, July 10-California vegetables are not seen to any great extent in this market nowadays. With the exception of tomatoes, corn and cauliflower, local gardens and farms are supplying bulk. 4@6c per lb; gooseberries, 6@7c new potatoes also might be included. though Oregon crop is about ready. Onions will be in next week, some few already appearing from up the valley.

Merced, Cal., tomatoes were in great abundance this morning, but quality is not up to standard required, by any means, and price was somewhat shaded.

Hothouse and a few lots of field Oreon-grown tomatoes are by far the finest the market, though Mississippi sell freely and are cheaper. Asparagus is about done, the last lots not selling at all.

### Fruits.

The street was quite bare of stuff this morning, as the Southern train did not arrive until late in the day.

Loganberries are not in as good supply as wanted, and prices remain high, \$2.50 a box for 24s easily obtained.

Lemons and limes are selling in large quantities, and stocks are becoming low again. Limes are somewhat stiffer in price, as high as \$1.25 being obtained

Hawaiian pineapples have been on sale for a day or two.

A car of cantaloupes and one mixed fruits were due this morning.

### Eggs and Butter.

There continues to be a very good market for all concerned in the egg market, prices being firm at 22c, which is considered reasonable to buyer and satisfactory to seller. In some quarters a half cent is named on top of the generally accepted figure. Ranch eggs are not coming in sufficiently to meet requirements, but the light receipts are being augmented by the Eastern goods, that sell side by side with the local eggs. No Portland storage eggs are being withdrawn, as far as could be learned.

Butter is firmer, though there are still very heavy receipts from usual sources of supply, and some from quarters news salmon, 9hc; steelhead, 8c; shad, 4c. to this trade previous to this year.


