NOT SEPARATED IN DEATH

REMARKABLE COINCIDENCE OCCURS IN CHICAGO WHEN MAN AND WIFE DIE AT SAME TIME—COMPANIONS NEARLY 50 YEARS

CHICAGO, July 11.—Companions for nearly half a century in life, Arthur Graham, and his wife, of Jefferson Park, are not to be separated in death. Mrs. Graham died Monday and her husband passed away yesterday, less than 24 hours later. They will be buried together.

The remarkable coincidence show by the death of this husband and wife, is said to be quite consistent with the entire trend of their lives, which have been singularly united.

Mrs. Graham was taken ill on the 4th of July. It was not thought that her condition was serious, but diabetes developed and she grew worse. The day following the 4th Mr. Graham was stricken with an attack of heart disease, to which he had been subject for many years. In a separate room, but hear that of his wife he lay suffering Monday, when Mrs. Graham died. Shortly before the end came she expressed some surprise that her husband had not been in to see her, but members of the family explained to her satisfaction without telling her that he, too, was ill.

Nor was the fact of his companion's death communicated to Mr. Graham, his children fearing that the shock might kill him. Monday night, however, he seemed to be improved, and it was thought advisable to tell him yesterday, but he suddenly grew worse and died, not knowing that his wife had gone.

Mr. Graham was 70 years and his wife 60. They leave five children.

VAN WINKLE FAMILY IS TRUE TO WILLAMETTE

ALBANY, Ore., July 11.—For 20 years there has not been a time when a child of Rev. I. N. Van Winkle, an honored pioneer of Linn County, was not attending Willamette University. There has not been a single term of school at Willamette since 1886 when there was not at least one Van Winkle there. Four of Rev. Van Winkle's children are graduates of Willamette University. They are James S. Van Winkle, one of Albany's most prominent men and chairman of the Republican Central Committee of Linn County; I. H. Van Winkle, of Salem, assistant attorney-general of Oregon, now president of the Alumni Association of Willamette University; Mrs. Dr. J. G. Patterson of Merrill, Ore., and Dr. J. O. Van Winkle, of Wendling, Charles Van Winkle, the youngest son of the family, is now a student in the Methodist institute.

BIG REAL ESTATE DEAL TRANSACTED AT EUGENE

EUGENE, Ore., July 11.—One of the largest real estate deals ever made in Lane County was consummated yesterday, when Eli Bangs, Eugene's pioneer liveryman, sold a quarter of a block of ground at the corner of West Ninth and Olive streets to G. M. Bonnett, a farmer of this city, for \$35,000. A two-story brick building and large frame livery stable buildings are on the ground and they are included in the sale. Mr. Bangs secures in the deal a 960-acre stock farm in Harney County, which his son, Abraham, of this city, will conduct.

PROHIBITION IN WALLOWA.

WALLOWA, Ore., July 11.—Since the saloons in this county closed their doors to patrons at 12 o'clock June 30 no liquor has been sold within the county limits. No act of disobedience has been reported, and from all appearances prohibition reigns supreme.

Mr. Palmer for 52 years was president of the National Broadway Bank and was 92 years old when he died. He made a small annuity to his older brother, remembered religious and charitable institutions that he was interested in and left his residuary fortune to the Francis Asbury Palmer fund, which he organized before he died, for the support of home missions, ministers, and churches.

BOY IS CHOKED TO DEATH AT ANACONDA

BUTTE, Mont., July 11.—The body of 13-year-old Willie Barkovich was found today under a sack of oats in the warehouse of Polich & Company, grocers, at Anaconda, says a special dispatch from that city to the Inter-Mountain. The lad had been missing since July 3. The boy had evidently been choked to death.

Willie Bailey, who, with other boys, had been shooting off firecrackers at the back of the grocery store on the afternoon of July 3, told the police that John Kilean, driver for Polich & Company, after ordering the boys away had caught young Barkovich and carried him into the warehouse. Bailey says that he heard screams from Barkovich.

Kilean, who has been arrested, claims to know nothing of the affair. Other arrests are expected to follow this afternoon.

CONSTRUCTION SLOW ON THE OREGON TRUNK ROAD

THE DALLES, Ore., July 11.—W. F. Nelson, president of the Oregon Trunk Road, says construction work is progressing slowly because of the scarcity of laborers. Mr. Nelson expects to secure plenty of laborers after harvest. It is the purpose of the company to push the road on to Madras, a distance of 110 miles from the Columbia, as soon as it can be built, and then to build through Central Oregon and make connection with some southern road.

HORSE HEAVEN WHEAT CROP A BANNER ONE

NORTH YAKIMA, Wash., July 11.—The wheat crop of the Horse Heaven country will be the largest in the history of the Yakima Valley, if present indications continue to hold good. Cutting will not be commenced for about two weeks yet, but the farmers are preparing for this event. The wheat is now reported to be looking fine. The rains of June brought it out in good shape. There was an increase in the acreage over the previous year.

SENATOR E. W. HAINES ACTS AS MOTORMAN

FOREST GROVE, Ore., July 11.—Senator E. W. Haines, the promoter of the new electric line from the depot to the business center of this place, acted as motorman on the car yesterday. He made several trips to the depot but there was not sufficient power to operate the line satisfactorily. It is thought the cars will be in full operation in a few days.

MUTINY OF SAILORS.

Crew of Two Battleships Revolt and Join Garrison.

SEBASTOPOL, July 11.—It is reported that the ironclads Pantelmon and Three Saints have joined the garrison of Batum forces, which are in mutiny. The mutineers are forcibly detaining two other ironclads.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 11.—There is no confirmation of the Sebastopol rumor of the seizure of the battleships at Batum. Dispatches from Batum today make no mention of disorders.

Milukoff For Premier.

EX-CORONER HELD UP.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 11.—Within half a block of his home on Vallejo street, Dr. T. D. W. Leland, former coroner of this city, was held up and robbed of \$175 in gold, a \$280 check, a gold watch, a gold match safe, and a Masonic gold badge, last night about midnight. The robbers were two young men, unmasked and with the gun that one of them carried he threatened death if resistance was offered. After being released by the men Dr. Leland followed them for six blocks, but lost track of them. Both men were young and apparently inexperienced as highwaymen.
