Unless train connections can be effected through which the meat can be delivered not much over 10 to 12 hours after shipping, it were far better and more profitable to dispose of it at home than to ship in during hot weather. The crematory makes no returns for stuff sent to be converted into fertilizer; on the other hand, there is cartage to be paid. It is extremely doubtful if any large profit is made in raising colves to dispose of to the garbage man.

Dealers can and do sell prime veals at good prices, and there is a good healthy demand for them. The carcasses must, however, be in first-class condition to get the benefit of quoted prices. The only way to receive expected returns is to get the meat through rapidly.

No sort of meat keeps in transit is hot weather unless frozen, and points given concerning veal shipments apply to dressed mutton, lambs and hogs as

Eggs and Butter.

There continues to be a very good market for all concerned, in the egg market, prices being firm at 22c, which is considered reasonable to buyer and satisfactory to seller. In some quarters a half cent is named on top of the generally accepted figure. Ranch eggs are not coming in sufficiently to meet requirements, but the light receipts are being augmented by the Eastern goods, that sell side by side with the local eggs. No Portland storage eggs are being withdmwn, as far as could be learned.
