PORTLAND, July 14.—The week inaugurated one of the most important movements the wholesale business of this city has been concerned in for some years.

The initial cargo was not up to expectations of the owners, but as everything has a beginning, those most interested in making the venture a success regard the 500 tons of Portland merchandise as a started toward a large trade.

Jobbers of this city repeatedly have said that with direct transportation to the Islands and to Alaska they would be enabled to enter those markets and compete successfully with other coast cities for at least a portion of the trade.

The starting up of this new line brings the desired outlet in one direction, and may be the fore-runner of the other.

Merchants generally report a continuation of activity, extending into the usually dull season much longer than in recent years.
