PORTLAND. July 21 .- The Oregonian tomorrow will say that activity of the Northern Pacific surveyors and rightof-way agents from Kelso to the mouth of the Columbia gives rise to the belief that Hill intends to carry wheat from the Palouse fields to a point opposite Astoria and there load grain ships using empty cars as shingles from Southwestern Washington points to the East. Delegates Will Spend Six Weeks Taking Up and Settling Vital Questions -Secretary Root In Attendance.

WASHINGTON. July 21 .- The third international American conference which will be called to order at Rio Janeiro. Monday, is one of a great triology of

American family gatherings during the close of the past, and the beginning of the present century destined, in the opinion of publicists, to have a most important bearing on the future of the nations of the Western Hemisphere. Conceived in the mind of the late Secretary Blaine, the idea of bringing into close relations the different governments of North.
