Child Incinerated in Lane County Steamship Barracouta Creeps Into the Harbor.

ASLEEP WHEN FIRE STARTED SCHOONER W. F. JEWETT HERE

Seven-Year-Old Virgil Purvance Sleeps Alone in Log Cabin Which Catches Afire-Youth Unable to Escape -Other Boy Rescued.

COTTAGE GROVE Ore., July 21 .-Virgil Purvance, 7-year-old son of Ernest Purvance, was burned to death at Bonita postoffice last night. Bonita post office is better known as a warehouse, and the building that burned was an old log house, which has for years been used as a stopping place and roadhouse for travelers going to the Bohemia mines.

The postoffice building, which was a more recent addition to the old building was also burned, but by hard work the stables, warehouses and scales were saved. The electrical generating plant of the Oregon Securities Company, of which Mr. Purvance has charge, are situated at this point.

As nearly as can be learned, every-one had gone to the power-house to watch the men putting on the big belt that transmits power from the water wheel to a big dynamo.

About 10 o'clock their grandmother took two little boys over to the house, and put Virgil, the older to bed upstairs in the log building, and the younger to bed in the postoffice building. When the fire was discovered it was already too late to save Virgil, but his brother was taken safely from the adjoining

About one year ago Virgil was visiting with his aunt. when his little cousin was burned to death in a brush fire.
