

CONVENIENT AND ROOMY.

An Up to Date Home For a Narrow Lot—Cost \$2,500. [Copyright, 1906, by Stanley A. Dennis, 214 Broadway, New York.] The accompanying elevation and floor plans show a very attractive and nicely arranged home designed especially for narrow lots.

There is a stone cellar under the entire house, the floor of which is cemented. The cellar contains cold room, coal bins and a modern steam boiler. The frame of the house is of spruce and hemlock mortised and tenoned together.

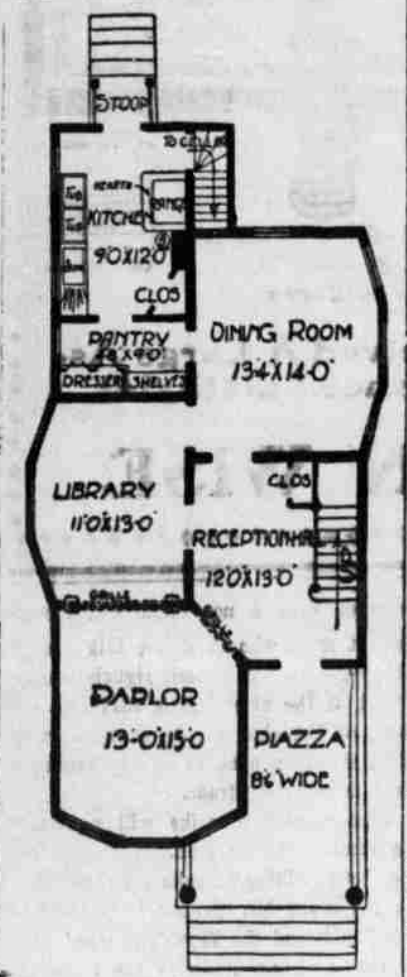


FRONT ELEVATION.

The walls are sheathed, covered with two ply building paper, white pine beveled siding and cypress shingles. The roof is of heavy dimension cypress shingles covered with two brush coats of stains.

The piazza columns are turned from yellow pine, finished in the natural wood, with composition caps to match. The ornamental exterior work is of composition.

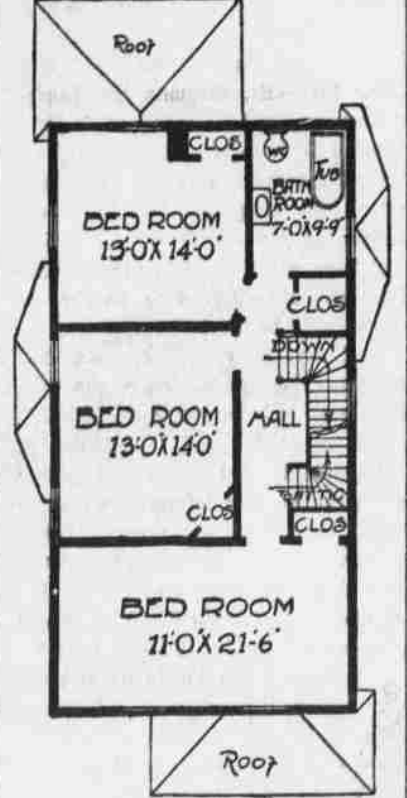
The exterior is painted with two coats of white lead and linseed oil.

The interior walls are plastered with two coats of patent plaster, scratch and brown coat, which contains white sand, troweled out smooth for tinting in various shades with cold water. All the rooms have fancy paper borders to match the tinting.

The kitchen and bathroom have modern open nickel plated plumbing and

fixtures. The side walls of the bathroom are tiled four feet high, with a heavy molded cap. The bathroom has a medicine closet, with mirrors in the door, built in the wall over the wash basin. The pantry of the dining room is fitted up thoroughly.

This house can be built, with two large rooms in the attic, for \$2,500 in localities where prices of material and labor are normal.
