

SHUN POOR LEPER WATERFRONT ITEMS

West, Virginia, Maryland and Pennsylvania Refuse Him.

SENT FROM PLACE TO PLACE

Syrian Leper Is Deported From Elkins to Parkersburg, West Virginia, and Again Sent Back to Elkins.

PARKERSBURG, W. Va., August 2.—George Rossett, the Syrian leper who has been an uninvited guest in this city since Tuesday noon and was last night smuggled away in a special train on the Baltimore and Ohio, with two constables to Elkins, his former abode.

Rossett's deportation was arranged in secrecy and was not generally known when he had left that town. Rossett's removal was by order of Governor Dawson. On a grassy plot at the rear of the B. & O. station, with ropes stretched about to keep back the people, Rossett spent his time while here sleeping and talking with those who ventured near. He did not seem to mind the circumstances in connection with his trip to this city and claimed the Parkersburg people gave him better treatment than he received elsewhere. The district attorney's office sent a telegram to Leslie M. Shaw, Secretary of the Treasury, asking that the state take charge of Rossett and have him removed to North Brothers Island, N. Y., but no answer was received. A box car was sidetracked Tuesday night near where the leper took up his quarters and he refused to take it, preferring to stay in the open air. From then until he left this city he camped on the unsheltered ground, without a bed of any sort.

B. & O. railroad officials say that Rossett ate hearty and despite the fact that he had been shunned and neglected, had an abundance of food. The trial of the officials and the Maryland physician who were charged with bringing Rossett here, has not yet been held. It is set for tonight and all three will appear having given bonds. The railroad company contends that it was not responsible for Rossett's visit here.

NOT BARRED FROM NEW YORK.

NEW YORK, August 2.—New York has no bars against the Pariah of West Virginia, Maryland, and Pennsylvania. The leper who has been driven out, side-tracked, forbidden to cross New Jersey and kept a prisoner in a freight car with no regular supply of food or water.

Dr. Doty, quarantine officer, after a meeting yesterday of the New York Board of Health, Dr. Darlington and I are agreed that in New York leprosy is not a factor in state sanitation, we don't consider it at all further than to hold that in this country it is not a menace to the public. No, there is no prohibition against this poor outcast coming to New York.

"I think it most inhuman the way this man was treated," said Dr. Doty.

KITSAP MAKES FAST TIME

A. F. Rober Returns From the Sound Where He Reports a Successful Run of the Fast New Steamer Kitsap

Chief Engineer A. F. Rober, of the government steamer Major Guy Howard, has returned to this port and his post, from his recent visit to the Sound, whither he went on the new steamer Kitsap, in the capacity of advisory engineer. He reports the Kitsap, on her first run in those waters, from Seattle to Tacoma, was made on exactly the Flyer's best time, a distance of 28 miles in 1 hour and 28 minutes. He reports that his son, Will Rober, has been promoted from the junior class of engineers of the great steamship Minnesota, to the senior. Will sailed on the 25th of July. Apropos of Chief Rober's account of the Kitsap, the following taken from yesterday's Tacoma Ledger, is of interest: "The new steamer Kitsap was given her trial trip yesterday. She went over the trial course of the battleship Nebraska, making the excellent time of 18 miles an hour until she met with a mishap off Robinson's point by the breaking of a feed pipe, disabling her. The Kitsap was towed into Seattle by the steamer T. W. Lake and will be repaired."

They do say that Captain Jim Keating, of the handsome motor launch Pilot, takes on a grim smile these days when he has a crowd of O. "In New York leprosy is no factor. Leprosy is one of those disorders medical science knows very little about. Dealing with facts, as we do, and not with theories, we have learned that though leprosy occurs in parts of the United States, there are no reported instances of one case having caused others. There is a popular fear of it. But the fact as they have been observed do not warrant the fear.

"Tuberculosis is more communicable. Yet we have no sentiment behind a movement to segregate consumptives."

"A man who had been nurse in the hospital in the Department of Mindanao, Philippines, offered yesterday his services as attendant upon Rossett. This nurse is W. H. Tanthram of 247 West Eighteenth street. "I have worked in hospitals where there were hundreds of lepers," he said, "and it is my belief that the chances of contagion by an American are very remote."

NEW YORK, August 2.—A cable dispatch to the Herald from Paris says:

Thirty-two young American women adjudged the most popular in Kentucky through a newspaper voting contest and who arrived Tuesday night, had their first day of sightseeing Wednesday. The French papers, like the English, occasionally assume that girls are chosen for beauty. Hence they are making comparisons with French girls not at all complimentary to the girls from America. The girls don't seem to mind it because they have been described by French papers as a "bevy of American beauties."

There was a crowd of between 1000 and 1500 excited men and women waiting for their appearance at the Hotel Du Louvre, nor was it polite or respectful mob. They passed open judgment on the young women, favorable or unfavorable, according to fancy.
