ARM WAS BROKEN BY HIS OWN FOLLY

OLE SORENSON WOULD HEED NO
WARNINGS AND WAS STRUCK
BY SUNDAY MORNING'S EX-
PRESS TRAIN.

By reason of his sheer perversity, or
stupidity, it is hard to determine which,
Ole Sorenson, a middle-aged man and
citizen of this county, lies at St. Mary's
hospital with his left arm badly broken,
and his head and body most uncomfort-
ably bruised and scratched. That he is
not ready for the grave is one of the
marvels that sometimes attend railway
accidents.

On Sunday morning last he was in the
neighborhood of Tongue Point, where
the Astoria & Columbia River Railroad
makes through the cut back of the
point, and as the 8:20 express out of
this city, Portland bound, was approach-
ing the cut, he deliberately stepped on
the track with the intention of crossing
it, despite the shrill and continuous dan-
ger whistles blown for his benefit by
Engineer Dick Evans, in charge of the
big locomotive that was hauling the
train. He had been warned to avoid
the train by two or three lads who were
standing by him when the train was
seen coming, but he paid no attention
to words nor whistles but went forward
and was taking the step that might have
put him beyond danger when the mas-
sive pilot-timber struck him violently
on the left side and hurled him against a
nearby cattle-guard. He had an ac-
cordion under his arm and the instru-
ment was shattered beyond all recogni-
tion.

The train was brought to a stand-
still and the train crew picked him up,
put him on board, and the line slipped
back to the depot, whence he was taken
to St. Mary's hospital and a physician
summoned to his relief. The train then
made its second start for the metropolis,
just 45 minutes behind time.

Engineer Evans says he never saw so
thoroughly stupid a piece of business in
his life; and for a few moments he
was convinced the man was doing the
suicide act, so deliberate were his move-
ments and so plain must have been his
danger to him.

At all events, he is laid by the heels
for some time to come, though he is in
no sort of danger of death. He will be
thoroughly cared for and in due time
will be able to go about and do such
work as he is accustomed to; but it is
doubtful if he has any appreciation of
the wonderfully narrow escape that was
his. That the train had slowed down to
ten miles an hour as is the company rule
at that particular point, or there would
not have been enough of Sorenson to
sweep up.

In Summer Camp.—The soldiery of
Fort Stevens and Columbia are now in
summer camp at the former post, and
the maneuvers of the year are in pro-
gress there. Yesterday morning, for in-
stance, the steamer Major Guy Howard
made a trip to sea and return, she being
considered, for the time being and the
purposes of the hour, to be a fleet of
six line of battleships, four armored
cruisers and nine gunboats, and was
cut full of imaginary holes as she
crept by the imposing fort and the mighty
guns that "bristle" in the embrasures.
After being duly riddled with shell and
shot, she came on up to the city for her
usual supply of good things to eat, and
went back with her customary rapidity,
apparently none the worse for the en-
gagement.

Thicker Than Rees.—Word comes up
from Tillamook City that the hotels
down there are so full of railway sur-
veyors that the ordinary tourist cannot
get a room to save his life. They are
simply swarming all over the place. As
usual, they are "star" talkers; that is,
one might as well question the stars as
one of these gentry; no one knows
whence they come, who they represent,
where they are going, what they are do-
ing, nor if they have any fixed purposes.
A gentleman just from there is respon-
sible for this account of the invasion,
and he is inclined to think it means
something tangible in the matter of the
extension of the Astoria & Columbia
River Railroad from what few morsels
did seep through the silence.

Will Be Tried Here.—At Seaside, on
Saturday last, Editor R. W. Watson, of
the Seaside Signal, was wantonly as-
saulted in the open street, by B. J. Cal-
lahan, the saloonkeeper there, and he
will answer a charge of assault and
battery in Justice Goodman's court here
on Wednesday next. Constable John
Sayer went down yesterday to serve
the warrant and subpoenas. The case is
said to have been utterly without provo-
cation. It is understood that Callahan
will demand a jury trial here.

CHAMBER MEETS IN PUBLIC SESSION

ATTENDANCE MEAGRE, BUT SOME
MATTERS OF BUSINESS ARE
DISPOSED OF—YOUNG LADY
NOMINATED FOR HONOR.

There was but a meagre attendance at
the regular August session of the As-
toria Chamber of Commerce, at the Bond
street rooms last night. President J.
W. Welch was in the chair and Sec-
retary C. R. Higgins had charge of the
records.

Among the important items, of corres-
pondence presented by Secretary Hig-
gins was a letter from Phillip S. Bates,
publisher of the "Pacific Northwest,"
advising the chamber that he had nomi-
nated Miss Anita C. Trenchard, of this
city, as the representative for Clatsop
county, in the contest for the free ex-
cursion trip to the Jamestown Expo-
sition to be given by that publication next
spring. And the gentleman present un-
animously endorsed the selection made
by Mr. Bates in this relation.

A lively letter was read coming from
Secretary Ralph Ackley, of the Tillamook
County Street Fair & Carnival, to be
held at Tillamook City on the 23rd,
24th and 25th of August, urging the As-
toria Chamber of Commerce to join
hands with the Tillamookians in making
a grand success of the Fair above named,
and in answer thereto, it was ordered
by the chamber that whoever would go
there, from this city, might go as the
representative of the Chamber of Com-
merce, without further or formal ap-
pointment.

A letter was received and read, from
Colonel S. W. Roessler, in answer to a
recent communication sent him by the
Chamber of Commerce, in relation to
the deepening of the inshore channel
along the city front, between Fort
Stevens and Tongue Point. The matter
was discussed at some length and re-
sponsible in an order to the secretary to
ask Major Roessler to fix a date for his
visit here for the conference with the
chamber on this subject.

The meeting then adjourned until the
meeting in course.

HON. JOHN FOX NAMED FOR REGATTA

IMPORTANT MEETING HELD—DATE
FIXED FOR THE WATER CAR-
NIVAL—FESTIVAL IS FORMALLY
LAUNCHED IN GOOD STYLE.

Chairman R. M. Leathers, of the
Twelfth Annual Regatta, of Astoria, and
his eleven colleagues, along with several
other well known business men of the
city, held a meeting at the Tenth street
rooms in the Flavel Block, on Sunday
evening last, to scan the possibilities for
the festival.

It was ascertained that there were at
least \$5000 available, and this informa-
tion was directly responsible for the
motion that followed, and passed, to
hold the twelfth annual; and this per-
tinent conclusion was quickly followed by
another, fixing the time of the regatta
on Thursday and Friday, August 30 and
31 and Saturday, September 1, 1906.

The subject next in order was the
handling of the concession of the re-
gatta season, and this was formally dis-
posed of by the agreement to sell all
privileges for a fixed sum, of propor-
tionate value, and waive all share in
the proceeds; the disposition of the con-
cessions being left to a special com-
mittee consisting of Norris Staples, Mayor

Herman Wise and Albert Dunbar, their
work in the premises to have the sanc-
tion of the entire regatta committee.

In the matter of general advertising it
was decided to apportion the sum of
\$100 to the Oregonian; the sum of \$50 to
the Daily Budget and the Morning As-
torian, of this city, subscriptions of \$25
each, the same to be taken out in ad-
vertising.

An appropriation of \$150 was made in
favor of the water sports committee,
for fire works for the illumination of the
bay parade, at the instance of Chair-
man Troyer; while the question of the
"Queen" element was discussed at
length, but no decision reached. This
will be determined at an early date,
however, and a pleasing scheme evolved.
After duly electing Hon. John Fox, of
this city, as admiral of the regatta, the
meeting adjourned subject to the call
of the chairman.
