MORE TROUBLE NOW

Eureka Longshoremen Will Not Drive Winches in Loading.

IS HARD BLOW TO SHIPPING

Longshoremen Refuse to Drive Winches or Allow Any One Else Other Than Union Sailors to Do it—Tie up Likely

EUREKA, August 17.—The longshoremen at a special meeting last night struck a severe blow to shipping when they decided not to drive winches in loading vessels, handle ropes or perform any duties belonging to sailors.

AGAINST MUNICIPAL CONTROL.

Mayor McClellan Not Impressed With Success of European Methods.

NEW YORK, August 17.—A cable dispatch to the Herald from Berlin says: Mayor McClellan of New York, accorded a Herald correspondent an interview "I am sorry," he said, "that I shall not be home to take part in what undoubtedly will be a magnificent reception to Mr Bryan, but my sailing plans will not land me in New York until a full week after the reception."

When asked about New York state politics and whether he wanted the democratic nomination for governor, Mayor McClellan said: "No, I have got enough trouble of my own with three and a half years of New York still on my hands."

FREE LUNCH IS NOT SO FRESH

CHICAGO FOOD INSPECTORS FIND THAT SALOONS USE ROTTEN MEAT IN THEIR FREE LUNCHES—STENCH IS SOMETHING AWFUL

CHICAGO, August 17.—That the free lunch served in hundreds of saloons in Chicago is largely composed of meat in a condition absolutely unfit for use, was discovered yesterday by Food Inspector Murray, when his force of assistants raided a barn at 24 Illinois street, owned by William Davidson.

The place contained 30 stoves, over which six men were working in an endeavor to prepare decayed pork and beef into a semblance of its original form and thereafter "manufacture it" into free lunch for the saloon trade.

The raid of the Illinois street barn followed the inspection of a cold storage warehouse. The warehouse is a public one, and in it Inspector Murray found 2,000 pounds of meat unfit for use.

In addition to the equipment at the barn for converting unsaleable meats into cuts from supposedly good roasts, the inspectors found a plant for the manufacture of sausage of different kinds and those articles of food which usually are on the free lunch counters in the cheap or middle class saloons.

TENSION IS GREAT

Whites and Negro Soldiers on Verge of Hostilities.

NEGROES NOT YET WITHDRAWN

Senator Bailey Will Leave at Once For Washington to Try to Induce the Government to Remove the Negroes at Once.

BOWNSVILLE, Texas, August 17.—With both parties prepared for the attack and believing it to be imminent, there have been no especial developments today in the situation growing out of the recent trouble between the negro troops and the citizens of this place. The citizens committee has been advised that troops will not be withdrawn pending an investigation and state troops will not be sent here.

ADDRESS EVIDENTLY INSPIRED.

Negroes of Greenwood County Approve of Lynching of Davis.

COLUMBIA, S. C., August 17.—Negro citizens of Greenwood county today issued an address in regard to the lynching of Bob Davis. It was in part:

"We negroes of this county wish to say that we are with you and in anything so serious as this you have our assistance in anything you think best. We cannot afford as a race to uphold anything that tends to lower our Christian or moral standing, and the quicker we show we are ready to help trace the rascal to his den the quicker we will have the sympathy of the white man whom we intrude upon. It is unreasonable to expect white men to respect and protect us when we do not protect ourselves. The only thing wanted was the right man and that is what we had and we are satisfied."

DOES NOT WANT IT

Judge Turner Not Out for Vice-President's Seat.

SAYS "OUR GEORGE" IS MAN

Governor Chamberlain Declared by Turner to be Only Logical Man For Place if Western Man is Chosen.

SPOKANE, Wash., August 17.—"Under no circumstances would I permit the use of my name for the vice-presidential nomination," stated Judge George Turner today when shown an Associated Press dispatch quoting Governor Chamberlain of Oregon as urging Turner's nomination. The "nomination of a Bryan man will almost be taken for granted, and the nomination for vice-president will probably go to the East. Should it fall to the Pacific Coast, however, the natural, logical and inevitable candidate would be Governor Chamberlain who has twice carried his state, and would carry it for the party at the presidential election."

MAYOR WRIGHT REPLIES.

Answers Admiral Goodrich With Regard to Dancing Incident.

TACOMA, August 17.—Mayor Wright today sent a reply to the letter received some days ago from Admiral Goodrich, who complained that one of his sailors was abruptly and discourteously refused admittance to a public ball.
