PORTLAND, August 21.—After sev-

eral months' fluctuations in the sugar market, the two big refineries of California have apparently settled down to a parity of values.

A telegram from San Francisco says: "After five months' competition between the Western Sugar Refinery and the California & Hawaiian Sugar Refining Company, the price of sugar has dropped from \$5.15 to \$4.80.

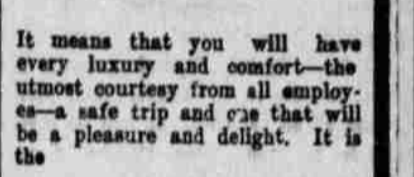
