## NORTH STAR AT HOME

Comes in From Alaska Over Week Ahead.

### NEWS OF THE NORTHERN PACK

Beckenham Departs For China—Cudahy in With the John Butler—Deck and Dock News of the Day—Heather Out on Duty.

The live event of the day among the marine chronicles of Astoria, was the unexpected arrival here yesterday morning, early, of the steamer North Star, from Nushagak, Alaska; she was not looked for until the last of the month as she had been reported, by letter, as billed to leave there on August 20th, Monday last. She is tender for the Alaska Fishermen's Packing Company's canneries in the north; and among her passengers from Bristol Bay, was Superintendent P. A. Berglund, of that company's business up there.

Mr. Berglund reports that they sailed from Nushagak on the 11th inst., and towed the ship Drummond to an offing as they passed out, and that she should be down in the course of a week. The ship St. Nicholas, of the Columbia River Packers' Association service, left out two days later, on the 13th, and the big ship Big Bonanza, of the North Alaska Company, was billed to leave out on the latter date.

He quoted some interesting packing figures from the north, among which are the following:

The ship Berlin will sail about one week behind the others, so Mr. Berglund things, from what he heard on leaving.

He is confident the northern pack will equal last year's, though the qualities are not all on a par with those of last season, pinks being well in evidence this year. All the canneries did well, except on the Kogging, where the pack was short.

He confirms the death of Harry Ainslie, on the ship Drummond, by falling from aloft, and adds that two Chinamen also died from disease during the stay of the fleets in the north. All hands are in excellent health, and devoutly glad to get back into civilization.

The crew of the North Star will be paid off today at the office of the Alaska Fishermen's Packing Company, and Secretary Noonan is ready on the same score for the 246 people nearly due home on the Drummond.

It seems the North Star overlooked some quarantine regulations on entering port yesterday morning, and all the crew and passengers, were hailed below to the quarantine grounds yesterday afternoon, inspected and duly released.

The tug John Cudahy arrived in port yesterday noon from Gray's Harbor with the unfinished steam-schooner Jim Butler in tow, bound for Portland, where the Butler will dock at the Willamette Iron Works pier, and have her boilers and machinery installed. She is a snug looking craft about the size of the Thomas L. Wand. The steamer Fannie of the Oregon Round Lumber Company's service met her here, and towed her to Portland.

The steamship Beckenham came down the river yesterday afternoon with 3,700,000 feet of good Oregon lumber on board, destined for Shanghai, China. She passed directly to sea, under the pilotage of Captain Gunderson.

The handsome Heather went to sea early yesterday morning on a trip up the Washington coast delivering supplies where they are most needed.

The Gerald C. is in port again and busy loading or another trip down the coast.

Stole Net.—On an information sworn to by Andrew Simonsen, Lars Olsen was arrested yesterday charged with stealing 250 fathoms of net. The charge stated that on the night of August 12th the defendant cut the complainant's net and some days later the missing gear was discovered in the defendant's boat. On arraignment before Justice of the Peace yesterday afternoon, Olsen denied the accusation, and asserted that his boat puller was the culprit. In spite of this however Olsen was held under \$300 bonds until Friday morning. His boat puller was arrested last night. Indications are that both men will spend some time behind the bars.

In Statu Quo.—Some days ago, in fact last Friday, Tim Corcoran, as deputy sheriff especially sworn in the case, was despatched by Sheriff Pomeroy to the Nehalem country, with a warrant for the arrest of Sim and Jim May, two young men who are wanted for committing a savage assault upon a citizen of this city. He went out to the Nehalem, and found his men had left for Forest Grove, and Mr. Corcoran sent word to that effect in to the sheriff's office. The Forest Grove authorities are on the lookout for the men, but up to last evening no word had been received from them.

Body Found.—The body of Gerard Barber, the boat puller of Stanley Bell, who was drowned Monday, August 13th, off Sand Island along with Bell, who recovered yesterday morning at Ilwaco, having been washed up on the beach. The young man was a resident of Portland and the morning of his death, was the first time he had been on the river. He was taking the place of the regular boat puller who was not able to work that day. The relatives of the deceased in Portland will be communicated with, and arrangements for the disposal of the body made.

Has Declared.—Arnio Vagarlo, a native of Italy, yesterday filed his formal declaration of intention to become an American citizen, with County Clerk Clinton.

### STRAIN'S IN TOWN.

Paul Strain, one of Portland's largest clothing merchants, and known to many Astorians, arrived in this city last night and is stopping at the Hotel Occident. Mr. Strain is proprietor of the immense clothing stores in Portland known as the Hub, the Chicago Clothing Store, and the Boston Clothing Store, and comes here with the intention of opening up a large clothing establishment, with a \$100,000 stock.

It has been two years since Mr. Strain has been in Astoria, and he says he can notice a great change in the town in the line of improvements. "Astoria has a great future before her," said he, "and the next few years are the ones that are going to count. Now is the time for all to get in on the ground floor in securing the advantages which are here, and which in a short time will be beyond the reach of the person of small means. The attention of outside capital is directed here for investment, and the growth of Astoria will be unprecedented in the next five years." Mr. Strain expects to open his place for business in a short time.
