PORTLAND, August 23.—With the exceptions of peaches, pears and apples Oregon seasonal fruits are either slow in maturing or crops are shorter than previously estimated. Peaches from various Valley and Southern Oregon points are not as plentiful as the market requires, and the early Crawford received from California last night were being rapidly moved today. Prices, however, are coming down to the basis of the advanced season and \$1.15 a box was the highest price quoted on the street this morning for choice fruit, and as low as 75 cents for inferior. A dollar a box is a fair average quotation right through.
