PORTLAND, August 24.—There was quite a marked scarcity of tomatoes in the local market this morning, which dealers in fruits and vegetables are inclined to think presages a growing shortage for the season.

Gardeners were advised early in the season that crops everywhere in the country promised to be light, and those who took the tip and set out additional plants will find a waiting market for their product.

Oregon tow-ties were quoted in some quarters as high as \$1 this morning, and California three-tier at \$1.25 to \$1.35, though figure are mostly temporary.
