BAR, BAY AND RIVER**Captain Wood's Enforced Trip
to Victoria.****STANFORD LEAVES TODAY****Tatoosh Relieves Vessel at Anchor on
Northshore—Elmore Arrives in
With Good News From Tilla-
mook—Odds and Ends.**

Captain George Wood, of the bar pilot
service, has just returned from an un-
expected trip he was, practically, com-
pelled to take to Victoria, B. C. He
left out over the bar from this port on
last Wednesday afternoon, as bar pilot
for the steam yacht El Impiro, recently
purchased at Portland by a wealthy citi-
zen of the Dominion capital, who had
brought over a party of gentlemen
friends to make the home-trip with
him on his newly acquired toy. They
made it, all right, thanks to Captain
Wood. When he got them out to sea,
he found to his amazement that every
man-jack of the party, including the
man who was to sail her to her destina-
tion (and who, by the way, was the
ex-master of a trans-Pacific liner), were
utterly incapacitated by sea-sickness
and other things, excepting, luckily,
the engineers. So instead of boarding the
pilot schooner off the bar, as was his
wont under such conditions, he was
simply forced, as a good seaman and a
man of judgment, to stand by the help-
less crowd, and see them through. This
he did, standing watch at the wheel
of the craft for 19 hours without rest,
and feeling his way up the Washington
coast in a dense fog; entering the
Straits of Fuca and picking his way
gingerly along the island coast, till 3
o'clock Thursday afternoon, when it
cleared, and permitted him to make the
only time on the voyage. When the El
Impiro entered the harbor at Victoria,
the dock was lined with anxious friends
of the yachting party, and as soon as
she tied up, they swarmed aboard, and
made things lively for all hands. A
royal supper was spread, and Captain
Wood was placed at the head of the
table and made the guest of honor, for
his loyalty in sticking to the benighted
outfit, and after a pleasant hour with
them, the doughty old seaman grabbed
his kit and lit out for the Seattle
steamer, en route home. He says he
cannot remember when he has done so
long a watch before in years, and has
not caught up with his sleep-allotment
yet.

Mrs. Captain Mollstad, wife of the
master of the fine barkentine Jane L.
Stanford, now lying in the stream ready

for sea and Sydney, Australia, with
her baby daughter, has gone to Portland
to visit friends, before returning to
her home in Seattle. She will not ac-
company the captain this voyage, as
the little girl is not in robust health.
Captain Mollstad went up to Portland
last evening for a farewell visit to his
family, and will return today at noon,
board his ship and leave out on his 50-
day journey to the Antipodes. There
are many people in Astoria whom he
has made friends with since his arrival
here in June last, and who will wish him
success and good luck wherever he
may be.

insurgents at Casajal near Santa Rosa.
After the first exchange of shots, the
rural guards chased the enemy, who dis-
persed and fled. The report of this
occurrence was received tonight and
says that 23 revolutionists were killed
or wounded.

This makes the engagement the most
serious yet fought. The rurals did not
sustain any serious injury. Those con-
ducting the affairs for the government
are considerably encouraged, while it is
undeniable there is some discouragement
among the conspirators, who a week ago
hoped the moderates would be swept
out of power immediately. A striking
feature of the situation is the compara-
tive difference of the masses of the
people. The average Cuban takes little
interest in the trend of events.

A NOBLE ENEMY.**The Fate of Mokran, a Moslem Chief
of the Side of Africa.**

France was never in greater danger
of losing her colonies in Africa than
during the war with Germany in 1870.
The troops were recalled from Africa
to take part in the conflict that was
going on against France, and Algeria
was left almost defenseless.

The hour for which the conquered
races had long waited had come, and
if a holy war had been proclaimed it
is probable that the French would have
been driven from northern Africa.

But the tribes did not rise while the
French had their hands full on the
other side of the Mediterranean, and
the fact was due to their fidelity to a
solemn pledge.

When the war broke out a chief of
great influence among the tribes, Mo-
kran, gave his word to the governor
general of Algeria that there should
be no insurrection while the war lasted.
That word was faithfully kept. Disas-
ter after disaster followed the French
arms. The defeats of the war culmi-
nated in the surrender of Paris.
But not a man of the tribes of Kabylia
stirred. The Moslem's faith was
plighted; the Moslem's faith was kept.

When, however, the last battle had
been fought and the treaty of peace
signed, Mokran, then released from
his word, gave the governor general
notice that in forty-eight hours he
would declare war. The French
armies, released from duty at home,
hurried across the Mediterranean. The
end was inevitable. Mokran, seeing
that all was lost, put himself at the
head of his warriors and fell fighting
in the front rank. The French erected
a monument to mark the spot where
their noble enemy perished.

CLATSOP'S TAX ROLL

For Year 1906.

County Assessor T. S. Cornelius, and his efficient deputy, F. P. Lien-
enweber, yesterday completed the tax-roll for Clatsop county, and the
same will be submitted to the county board of equalization, consisting of
Judge C. J. Trenchard, County Clerk J. C. Clinton, and County Assessor
Cornelius, at its formal session tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock, and any-
one desiring to correct, modify, or change his or her special tax list, as
embodied in this roll, will do well to approach the board during the coming
week, at the court house.

The roll of this year has been compiled upon a different system than
has prevailed heretofore, and the assessing officers are very sanguine of
the complete success of the processes employed. The basis used has
been the land itself, taken from the sectional maps of the county, and
platted maps of all cities, towns and sub-divisions, instead of upon the
ownership of property as recorded; and by this means there is not an
acre of land in the confines of the county escapes taxation, and which
makes it squarely fair for every tax-payer within the Clatsop jurisdic-
tion.

The new system may work something of a hardship upon the offi-
cers of the shirelivity for a little while until they get used to the man-
ner of its use in the collection of the tax, but that is something that
will overcome itself day by day, and Mr. Lienenweber will put in a
month or so assisting the sheriff and his deputies in that end of the
business, so that no great trouble nor delay is likely to ensue.

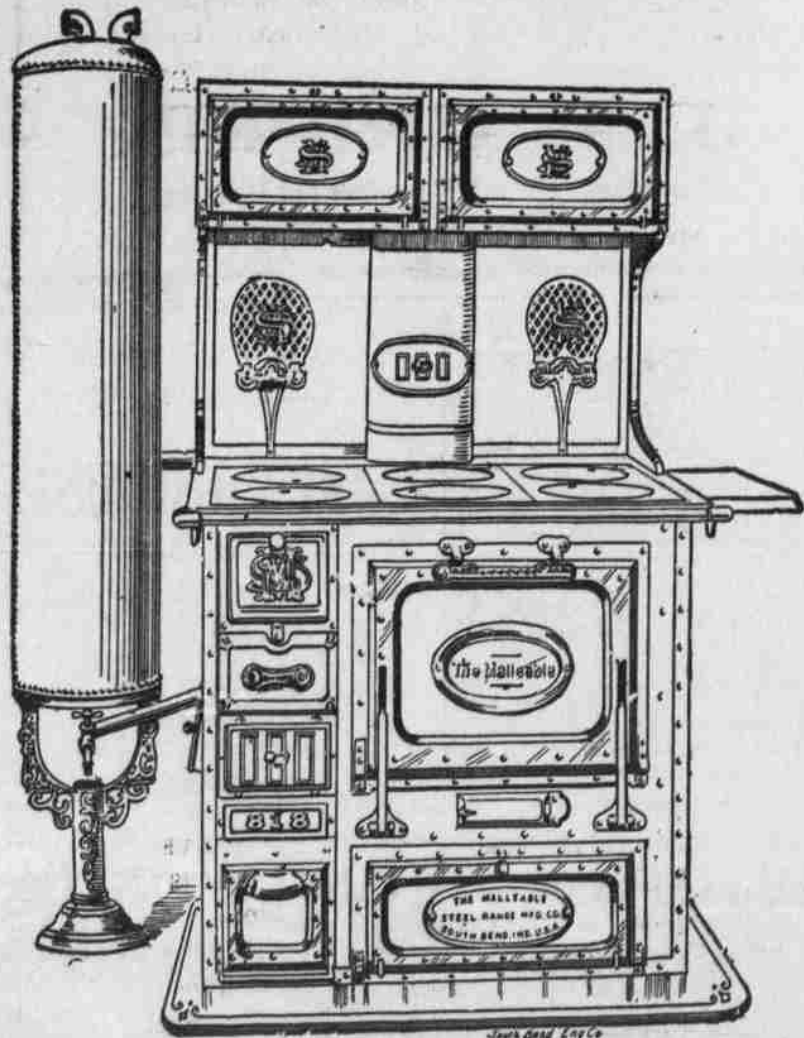
