READY FOR REGATTA

Committee Has Everything Coming its Way.

WATCH OUT FOR THE INDIANS

Chief George Charley of the Chinooks With Others of His Tribe Will Give Exhibition—Big Bench Show.

Blanket Did Good Work.—During the noon hour of Sunday last a fire alarm was turned in from Box No. 16, calling the department to the building occupied by Mrs. Nellie Shaw, at 682 Commercial street, where a lamp had been upset and set up a blaze, that might have amounted to a good deal, if some one had not made swift and adroit use of a blanket, and smothered the flames before the "boys" got there. No. 1's bob-tail cat "Chemical" did a funny stunt on the call, by mounting the chimney when it started out of the house. The pace got too warm from the housecat before it got to Eleventh street and she sprang off the flying wagon and turned nearly inside-out before she got squarely on her feet, and then she was lost, and it took her twenty-seven minutes to recognize the engine house 300 feet up the street, and about twenty-seven seconds to get there. Now you can't tell her her own length from the door with a live mouse.

Body Found.—A floater was picked up off McGowan's cannery late Saturday night and brought to Ilwaco and turned over to Pacific County Coroner Dr. T. S. Kennedy, who searched the body and found a watch (Elgin), purse with 65 cents, matchbox, pipe and tobacco, and a knife bearing the name of Alex Johnson, on one side, and McKinley's photo on the other. The clothes worn were blue jumper, striped shirt, heavy shoes and blue overalls. The man's age is in the neighborhood of 26 to 30. Upon inquiry the identity of the body was established as that of Alex Johnson, boat puller for L. Hagman. The two men were drowned on the 16th of the month near McGowan's by the capsizing of their boat. Hagman's body has not yet been found.

Fifty-five Entered.—The fifty-five kennels built for the Clatsop bench show, at the new court house, are, according to Ed. Llewellyn, all billeted with a tenant for next Saturday, the last entry yesterday being Al Seaford's famous blood-hound "Tracey," the dog that ran down the famous and infamous bandit. He is a wonder in his line, and has to be kept almost constantly housed or tethered to keep him from taking up a fixed scent on his own account and lighting out on a three or four day jaunt.

Pleasant Task.—It became the pleasant duty of F. D. Winton yesterday, as recorder of the local lodge of the A. O. U. W., to deliver to Mrs. Peter Sofmunson, warrant No. 82, on the grand treasurer of the order, in the sum of \$2,000, being the amount of insurance carried by her late husband, Peter Sofmunson. This is one of the infinitely valuable provisions made for the protection of the helpless ones in this life, and is a lesson worthy of emulation.

Many Potatoes for Alaska.—The indications are that more potatoes will leave the Columbia River for the Far North this year than in any previous season. One firm already has sent out 4,000 crates of Oregon tubers and other shipments to Alaska are being contracted for. It appears that the Oregon potato is in high favor in the North, for the demand for the product has for years been steadily growing. Potatoes are also being sent to Honolulu for the first time and the islands promise to be an important market for the product hereafter.

Day by day and hour by hour the far-reaching and interesting details of the regatta program are being drawn into careful and sequent alignment and by the time the opening hour arrives the long schedule of specialties will be in perfect readiness for unfoldment and the subsequent enjoyment of the thousands of visitors certain to be here. The general committee has overcome the rush of the preliminaries and is giving deliberate attention to all matters, big and little, with a view to permitting nothing to be overlooked and everything to be promptly and carefully disposed of.

An immense platform is to be erected by the committee on Twelfth street, between Commercial and Exchange streets, for the Country Dance, which will be kept going every afternoon and evening, with music that used to make your father and grandfather crack their heels.

The grand shore parade on the afternoon of the second day will be one of the events of the regatta season. The veterans of the G. A. R. have consented to join it and they, with the regulars from Fort Stevens and Columbia, the Chinook Indians, under Chief George Charley, in full tribal costumes, the Astoria police force, the Astoria fire department, the Queen and her navy and her middies; the Admiral and his staff; the mayor and common council; and a mile of carriages containing notabilities, including Governor Chamberlain, U. S. Senator C. W. Fulton, Orator George Noland and others, will make the alignment well worth seeing.

Chief George Charley, of the Chinooks, will be present with his people and their canoes, and will give two canoe races and one up-set; and his wife, a daughter of old Chief Nahcotta, will sing some of the old lore songs of the tribe, during the intermissions of the Country Dances.

It is said that the Grand Chancellor of the K. of P. has consented to the appearance of the Uniformed Rank in the big shore parade, a feature that will add decided interest to the pageant.

Ex-Police Chief Hallock will have full charge of the minor aquatic sports in front of the grand stand and will lend zest to the program in all ways.

The bench show will be one of the strong attractions and will divide honors with its neighbor, the County Fair, both in the new court house. The committee in charge of the former, Messrs. Ed. Llewellyn (chairman), Max W. Pohl and Gus Schoenbaechler, have left absolutely nothing undone to make the display of fine dogs in Clatsop a rare and successful element of the regatta. There will be twelve breeds in evidence, and over sixty kennels occupied, with "Squidge," the Boston terrier, the king and beauty-spot of the array. W. B. Feckhelmer, of Portland, will be one of the judges and his colleagues will be named in ample season to assist in the final awards.

"Four to Two"—The baseball game at the A. F. C. grounds on Sunday last was fairly well attended considering the fact that hundreds on hundreds went out of town, to the beaches and elsewhere for the day, and the game was closely contested. It was the Browns against the Portland Grays, with no scores made until the second half of the sixth inning, and the wind-up at four to two in favor of the home lads.

Shifting Players.—The Willard Stock company left for Portland yesterday morning for a week's rest, when they will return to the Star; and during the interim, the house will play a strong vaudeville combination for Regatta purposes. The specialists arrived on the noon express yesterday and opened last night.

singing is classed with that of some of the most noted specialists of the day and with abundant justice; Miss Louise Kessing, a coloratura whose marked abilities are drawing crowded houses there nightly and whose fine voice is a veritable magnet; the popular baritone, Mr. Purinton, who sings with great effect, "When Nellie Went Away;" the great Lorraine and his inimitable trained dog "Tease;" and a superb and interesting line of moving pictures constitute a thoroughly appreciated bill that is worth any one's time and money.

Prices Are Set.—Secretary Noonan of the Alaska Packers' Association yesterday stated that the opening prices for the United States markets in the Alaska salmon pack would be as follows: Red Alaska, 95c per dozen; medium red 85c. Pinks are firm and the price has been advanced from 75c at which pink opened six weeks ago, to 80c. These prices are on the basis of talls; the quotation on the few halves packed in the North is 85c, and on the flats, \$1.15. Figures on red Alaska talls are 10c higher than last year and on halves and flats last year's prices prevail. The total pack of Alaska is estimated at 1,600,000 cases. Reds and pinks have each fallen 150,000 cases below last year's pack.
