REDUCTION DESIRED.

Flour Committee of New York Produce Exchange Want Rates Reduced.

NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—The flour committee of the Produce Exchange has received a letter from the Trunk line roads, requesting a meeting to discuss a reduction on time of free storage of flour on their docks in the port from twenty to ten days for the domestic trade and from sixty to ten days for export, and to raise the rate per car from \$4 for ten days storage to \$1 per day. This is made necessary, the railroads claim, under the Hepburn law, which goes in force today, as under the present arrangement with the produce exchange the present rules will be a discrimination against other ports, which is forbidden, and in favor of New York.

The members of the flour trade were much excited over this action, and the flour trade compromise to visit Washington and lay the case before the Interstate Commerce Commission to who they will protest against such action.

A. J. Toomey said this change would kill New York as a flour export port and greatly injure local business and no one but the mills, which have their own docks here, would be benefited.

On the other hand, the representative of one of the large Minneapolis mills said he was in favor of the change and that it would not hurt the local trade of New York, as it will compel buyers to do business on business principles. As it is now, many jobbers have only an office and let their flour purchases lie on the railroad docks until it is sold and have neither store nor warehouses, but make the railroads furnish them.

STORM CAUSES DROWNINGS.

CHICAGO, Aug. 28.—The storm which swept over Lake Michigan Sunday, it is feared, caused the death by drowning of Dr. C. F. Bigelow of Evanston, and C. E. Lawrence, of Chicago, who left Saugatuck, Mich., Saturday for Chicago in a 15-foot launch and have not since been heard of.

A strong wind yesterday, following the storm of Sunday, kept the lake in a turbulent condition with very heavy seas running, which caused a number of minor mishaps to the smaller craft along the coast.

Three motor boats were upset off Edgewater during the day, leaving their occupants clinging for two hours to the keels until nearly exhausted, they were rescued by fishermen who heard their cries for help. The members of the party were Commodore Hoffman of the North Shore Motorboat Club, Kenneth Eddy, and wife, Mrs. Mary Clark, all of Edgewater, and John Rush of Chicago.

Mr. Rush was almost drowned when assistance reached the party and it was some time before he could be revived.

COMPLETION IN SIGHT.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 28.—President E. H. Harriman notified the San Francisco offices of the Southern Pacific yesterday that the work on the extension of the Cananea, Yaqui River & Pacific Railway from Alamos, Mex., through Mazatlan and down to Tepic and San Marcos will soon be completed. The extension is being hurried because of the determination on the part of Harriman to open up this country as a freight feeder of the Southern Pacific.

The extension of the Harriman lines now reaches from Guayam to Alamos. The distance to Mazatlan is 75 miles. The roadbed on this section has been partly completed and will not take many months to finish.

The country surrounding Mazatlan, Alamos San Marcos and Tepic promises to become a big freight district of the Southern Pacific. Most of the importations for this section are shipped to Mazatlan or Mazatlan and carried overland.

35 COMPANIES PAY UP.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 28.—Thirty-five insurance companies out of the 120 involved in the San Francisco disaster have paid, in the aggregate, \$55,103,863.22, according to their official records to date.

Some of the large concerns have made heavy payments. The Royal of Liverpool is credited with \$3,804,000.41, the Hartford with \$3,013,705, the New York underwriters with \$3,496,787, the Aetna of Hartford is down for \$3,126,502, and the Liverpool & London & Globe for \$3,721,288. Six companies have paid upwards of two millions apiece, while an equal number have exceeded \$1,000,000.

ILLINOIS DEMOCRATS LEAVE.

CHICAGO, Aug. 28.—One hundred leading Democrats of Illinois will leave Chicago for New York this afternoon to assist in welcoming William J. Bryan back to the United States. Charles Boeschenstein, chairman of the Demo-

cratic State committee, will be in charge of a party of 85 who will leave at 1:15 p. m. over the Lake Shore & Michigan Southern and Mayor Edward F. Dunne of Chicago will head a delegation from the Iroquois and Jefferson clubs who will leave by a later train. Roger C. Sullivan, national committeeman from Illinois, who was endorsed by the Democratic State convention last week at Peoria, over the protest of Mr. Bryan, will also leave for New York today and he expects to be present at the ceremonies, attending the welcome of Mr. Bryan back home.

FOUGHT FATAL DUEL.

PHOENIX, Ariz., Aug. 28.—George Melich and M. Vukamanovich, Montenegrin miners, spent Saturday drinking and quarrelling. Friends frequently separated them during the day. Toward night, by agreement, they met near town both armed. Melich fired five times without effect. Vukamanovich fired once, mortally wounding his adversary and is now in hiding.

FOR CHILEAN RELIEF.

NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—The Chile relief committee has received subscriptions amounting to over \$20,000.

The subscriptions yesterday to the Merchants' Association of New York Chilean Relief Fund, amounted to \$3,575, bringing the total sum raised by the Merchants' Association to \$8,080.
