IN FRISCO****JAMES FARLEY, STRIKE BREAKER,
SHIPS EIGHT HUNDRED MEN
FROM NEW YORK TO SAN FRAN-
CISCO TO CRUSH STRIKE.**NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—James Farley,
the strike breaker, has, says a morn-
ing paper, contracted to break the street
railway strike in San Francisco.Two special trains loaded with strike
breakers, left Jersey City at 10:40
o'clock last night on the Lehigh Valley
road for San Francisco. It was esti-
mated that there were 800 men on the
two trains, which had ten cars each.On each car were four of Farley's de-
tectives armed with clubs like the night
sticks carried by policemen.Every preparation had been made to
feed the men on the trip and to pre-
vent any unnecessary delay in getting
to the coast. Great quantities of cooked
food were put on the trains. A beer
supply consisting of 8,000 bottles was
on hand to stave off thirst. There were
800 tin cups for them to drink from.
Precautions were taken to keep the thing
as quiet as possible. The men were
brought over to Jersey City in a special
ferryboat from 23rd street. Many of
the men went without a change of
clothing and there were indications that
there was great hurry in getting the
men off.Some of the men, it was said, had
not notified their families that they were
off on a long trip.Arrangements have been made by
Farley, it is understood, to start another
batch for San Francisco early this morn-

Reaches Port.****STEAMER NORMAN ISLES HERE**Steamer Norman Isles Here—Alliance
Off for Eureka—Elmore to Gray's
Harbor This Morning—Numantia
Departs for Orient.The fifth-class cruiser Dogalia, of the
Royal Italian navy, commanded by Cap-
tain Marcus Cappomazzo, from San
Francisco was looked for all day
yesterday, as she was billed to arrive
here sometime during the day, but at
sundown had not been reported from
the Heads. Dr. Ferdinando Candiani, the
consular agent of Italy, at Portland,
spent the day here waiting to greet the
ship and her officers and accompany
them up the river, but was one among
the crowd of disappointed people all
about here, and will stand by for her
arrival this morning. The doctor is well
known from one end of Oregon to the
other, and is one of the urbanest of gen-
tlemen. He is going to do his utmost
to induce Captain Cappomazzo to bring
the ship here for the Regatta, or for
so much of it as arrangements can be
made and not conflicting with the com-
mander's orders. It will be one of the
chiefest pleasures of the regatta sea-
son if such a visit can be provided, and
the City of Astoria and her guests will
be gratified beyond measure. It is con-
fidently expected she will cross in this
morning. She carries a crew of 350
men. It is said the Dogalia has made
the complete voyage from New York,
taking in all the great seaports on both
coasts of both North and South Amer-
ica, and while at Rio Janeiro ascended
the river Amazon for a distance of 2-
000 miles. She touched at Montevideo,
Valparaiso, Callao, Acapulco, San Fran-
cisco and Astoria and will go
hence to the Sound, touching at Vancou-
ver, Victoria, Seattle and Tacoma be-
fore leaving for home. She is billed to
reach San Francisco on the return trip
on the 20th of September, the national
Italian holiday, commemorating the Uni-
fication of Italy. She was sighted off
the heads at 7 o'clock last evening.The Norwegian steamer Norman Isles
arrived in yesterday evening from Seat-
tle in ballast for Portland, where she
will take on a cargo of lumber for the
orient. The Norman Isles left Seattle
Monday afternoon at 1 o'clock and made
a fairly quick passage down the coast
considering the fact that thick weather
prevailed all the way. The Norman Isles
originally brought a cargo of cement
from London to San Francisco, unload-
ing part at the Bay City and the re-
mainder in the Puget Sound port.The steamer Alliance came down from
Portland yesterday morning early and
left out for Eureka at 7 o'clock, carrying
a small bunch of freight from here, some
six or seven tons, and four passengers,
as follows: Mrs. W. A. Sager and little
daughter; G. B. Flye, D. E. Wheeler, of
Denver, and Mrs. C. F. Morris.The steamer Roanoke will return to
this port from Portland on Friday morn-ing next, en route to the California
coast. Among her passengers for As-
toria were Miss Kate Shively, Mrs. Sa-
rah Ross, and Miss Birdie Gunderson.The steamer Sue H. Elmore arrived
in from Tillamook yesterday morning
with a big crowd of passengers, and
plenty of freight. She will leave this
morning for Gray's Harbor with a cargo
of cannery supplies, returning here Fri-
day noon.United States Inspectors of Hulls and
Boilers Edwards and Fuller arrived in
the city yesterday on official business.The German steamship Numantia ar-
rived down from Portland yesterday af-
ternoon, en route to Yokahama and
Hong Kong, with an immense and val-
uable cargo. She went directly to sea,
crossing out at 5 o'clock.The schooner Taurus will finish load-
ing lumber at the Clatsop Mills some
time tomorrow and will clear immedi-
ately for San Pedro.The schooner William Olsen has
cleared for San Francisco with 700,000
feet of lumber.The schooner Alumna took an even
million feet of good sound lumber when
she left out for San Francisco, from the
Knappton mills.The barkentine Chehalis and the
schooner Marconi are due in from San
Francisco and will load lumber outward
from the Simpson mills at Knappton.The steamer Thomas L. Wand has
arrived from San Francisco and gone on
to the metropolis for another big load
of lumber.The steamer F. A. Kilburn came in
from San Francisco yesterday at noon,
under command of Captain Merriam, and
left for Portland after a brief stay at
the Elmore pier.The steamer Telegraph continues to
spin up and down the river on her quick
schedule. She landed fifty-two people
here yesterday.The T. J. Potter came down on her
4:30 time yesterday afternoon with a
fair bunch of people for the northshore

As Boat Leaves Wharf.**William J. Pilcher, for many years a
lodging-house keeper of Portland,
dropped dead on board the steamer Ro-
anoke, up-bound, from San Francisco,
five minutes after she left the dock on
Monday night. The body was brought
to Portland on board the steamer and
was removed to the undertaking estab-
lishment of Coroner Finley. No inquest
will be held, inasmuch as his wife stated
that he was subject to heart attacks.Pilcher left Portland three years ago
and went into the rooming-house busi-
ness, at the Bay City, where he and his
family were at the time of the disas-
ter last April. They lost everything,
but remained in the ruined city until
Saturday night, when they started for
Portland or a short visit.When the Roanoke arrived here Pil-
cher took a stroll up town and seemed
to be in the best of health. Scarcely
had he boarded the steamer when he
suffered a stroke of heart failure and
without a word he dropped dead on the
deck. Pilcher was a very large man and
