PORTLAND, Aug. 28.—With an advance in city creamery butter to 27¢ announced to the trade this morning, country creameries stiffened and store became firm at about 15¢, though in some quarters a half cent higher is named. Cheese is quite firm and in all probability an advance will be quoted by the end of the week.

Ranch eggs became very scarce yesterday and today's receipts, up to noon, were not heavy enough to relieve the situation materially. One house that is handling large quantities quotes 24¢, but the generally expressed opinion is that 23¢ is top today. All dealers agree, however, that the market is very strong and predict higher prices in the near future unless the supply should suddenly improve.
