

THE COUNTY COURT

Clatsop County Commissioners Complete Business.

FOR THE MONTH OF AUGUST

Complete Report of the Proceedings of Clatsop County Court for August—Bills Allowed—Road Matters, Etc.

The Court, after considering all claims filed against the county, it is ordered that warrants be drawn on the various funds as follows

Table with 2 columns: Fund Name, Amount. Includes General Fund \$4,028.25, Road District No. 1 fund 555.09, etc.

Total amount of claims allowed \$5,140.14

The Court having examined the plat of "Hay Stack Rock Park" finds that the name does not conflict with any other plat in this county, that the taxes have been paid, and that there is no adjacent town or platted land and the same is in all respects in conformity with law.

It appearing to the court from the petition of C. S. Brown and 14 others; that the portion of county road No. 82 between the Lewis & Clark draw bridge and the right angle in said road where it turns north towards the addition of Merriweather Downs is sixty feet in width. That the extension of said road both east and west from said point is only 40 feet in width.

Communication from T. S. Cornelius, County Assessor, requesting that the time for the completion of the assessment roll be extended until Sept. 25.

Ordered that the assessor be allowed clerical assistance to write up a new lot book for the use of his office.

In the matter of the road petitioned for by Frank Bohnart and others, as follows, to-wit: Beginning on the south line of the Fred Beerman D. L. C. in sections 27, 28, 33 and 34, T. 6 N. R. 10 west, where it intersects the county road running from Seaside to the Elk Creek House, thence east on said south line of said Beerman D. L. C. to the east line of Section 33, thence in an easterly direction by the most practicable route to a point on the east line of the S. W. 1/4 of Section 34, said Township and Range, where said quarter section line is intersected by the base of the hill at Beerman Creek, said road to be 40 feet wide.

It is ordered that W. E. Cole, R. C. F. Astbury, County Surveyor, and John Frye, Road Master, constituting the Board of Road Viewers, be and they are hereby instructed to proceed to lay out, survey and view said road as petitioned for, and that they meet at Seaside on the 9th day of August, at 10 o'clock a. m.

Report of County Clerk and County Treasurer for six months ending June 30, 1906, also Sheriff's account as examined by Mr. Geo. P. Clark, expert accountant, read and examined by the Court. Ordered that the reports be published in condensed form, together with the report of Mr. Clark.

Communication from C. Hunt, Supervisor of Road District No. 9, requesting that a bridge be built across Bear Creek on the Carlson Road. Ordered that the clerk write the supervisor to advise the court as to the height, length and amount of lumber required for said bridge.

Communication read from Nat Jones, Keeper of the Lewis & Clark draw bridge No. 2, stating that the steamer Jordan had damaged the bridge while towing a raft through the draw. Ordered that the clerk ask the Callender Navigation Co. for a report on the matter.

Application of the Seaside Spruce Lumber Company for use of the county road scraper. Ordered filed as the scrap-

er is now being used by Warren and Campbell.

In the matter of terra cotta for the new court house. Letter from Gladden, McBean & Company, stating that they have about one car load of extra pieces, that they will hold same until the court house is completed, that they are ready to ship same as soon as any missing numbers are reported.

Application of Henry Hill, Supervisor Road District No. 14, for 5,500 feet of plank for repairing bridges in said district, and the Kelly Lumber Company agreeing to furnish same f. o. b. Seaside for the sum of \$15.00. It is ordered that the clerk request said company to deliver said lumber at Seaside, same to be 3x12x12 plank.

It is ordered that all the old cast iron at the Young's Bay draw bridge be sold to the Scow Bay Iron & Brass Works at the rate of 3-4 cents per pound at the bridge.

Report of the Road Master for the month of July, read and ordered filed.

The Court having considered the matter of the county saw mill, it is the opinion of the Court that owing to the high price of lumber the county saw mill should be disposed of, if possible, at a reasonable figure, with the idea of using the money for the purchase of another rock crusher. It is therefore ordered that the clerk ask for bids as follows, to-wit: Bids will be received for the purchase of the county saw mill at or near Jewell, Mill, boiler and engine is in good order and will be sold as it stands. All bids to be filed with the county clerk by Sept. 1. The Court reserves the right to reject any or all bids.

It appearing to the Court from the report of the Road Master that the work and grade on road No. 67 will have to be changed from a point on said road where it meets the picket fence on the north end of Caseys place to the intersection of road No. 95, it is ordered that Winter Bros' contract terminate at said fence. It is further ordered that the road master be instructed to arrange with any party or parties for the opening of said piece of road No. 67 to a sufficient width to allow driving over said road.

Upon the application of Henry Hill, Supervisor of Road District No. 14, it is ordered that the road master purchase a steel scraper for said district.

Ordered that the road master have a new sweep made for the Walluski draw bridge, same to be made of lighter material than the one now in use.

Ordered that the following gentlemen be appointed to represent Clatsop county at the annual meeting of the National Irrigation Congress to be held at Boise, Idaho, on Sept. 3 to 9th: Samuel Elmore, George W. Warren, J. Q. A. Bowlby, Asmus Brix, E. C. Jeffers.

Ordered that the following fire rangers be appointed: H. J. Antio for Push District; William Larson, for Chadwell District; J. C. Pope, for Elsie District; J. F. Barteldus, for Walluski District; John Niemela, for Olney District.

Communication read from Dr. Lewis stating that there is a destitute family at Seaside, that the head of the family is sick and they desire the county to place him in the hospital. Clerk instructed to write Dr. Lewis that if the party will come to the hospital, Dr. Fulton, Overseer of County Poor, will examine into his case.

Affidavit of Frank Scheidnager read, stating that he is assessed with timber on the NE 1/4 of Section 25, T 7 N. R. West, to the value of \$600, that said assessment is erroneous as the timber on the said land was logged off in the year 1902. And it appearing to the Court from the report of the assessor that said assessment for the year 1905 is erroneous, it is ordered that the sheriff allow said correction according to said affidavit.

Bid of P. A. Larson for clearing right of way and cutting wire grass between Adair's Slough and Brown's dike for the sum of 35 cents per rod, same to be one rod wide, read, and the Court being of the opinion that said bid is a reasonable one, it is ordered that the clerk notify Mr. Larson that the contract has been awarded to him at the price stated in his bid.

Upon the application of Judge Bowlby for the use of the basement of the new court house for the country fair to be held during the Regatta, the Court being of the opinion that the fair is a matter of interest and a benefit to the county, it is ordered that the request be granted.

Ordered that the Court do now adjourn until August 8th for the purposes of inspecting roads and bridges throughout the county.
