

WELCOMED AT BOISE WATERFRONT ITEMS

National Irrigation Congress Convened Yesterday. St. Nicholas and North King Arrive Home From the North.

OVER A THOUSAND PRESENT AZTEC MAKES HER FIRST TRIP

Roosevelt Sends Message to 14th Annual Session of Congress—Fairbanks Is Warmly Greeted by Irrigationists. Six Sailing Vessels Enter the Harbor Under Their Own Canvas—Heather Leaves on Southern Trip This Morning.

BOISE, Sept. 3.—President Fairbanks is today a guest of the city of Boise, and the National Irrigation Congress, which began its fourteenth annual session today. The convention received a letter of greeting from President Roosevelt, which evoked hearty applause and later by a resolution of the Congress an expression of thanks was telegraphed to the president. Fairbanks' address was fraught with encouragement for the irrigationists. The great wishes he spoke were fully appreciated, as was evinced not only by the hearty applause which greeted his speech but by the still greater applause which was later provoked when Senator Dubois in a witty speech asserted that the vice president was the probable Republican candidate for president.

The delegates, who numbered more than a thousand, were welcomed by brief addresses by Mayor Finney, Governor Gooding and Senator Dubois. Responses were delivered by U. S. Senator Carter, Governor Chamberlain and Judge Happy. Governor Finney, who did not attend in person, sent his annual address by mail. The afternoon was devoted mainly to addresses by officials of the government reclamation service. The campaign for the next congress is already on. Sacramento, Reno, Roseman, North Yakima and Washington, D. C. are candidates for the honor. The vice president this evening was tendered a reception at the city hall, and later delivered an address to the laboring men of the city from the balcony of the city hall.

MORMONS BUY LAND.

Large Tract is Purchased by Mormons in Mexico.

MEXICO CITY, Sept. 3.—Mormon representatives have purchased another large tract of land in Mexico. Some time ago they purchased for homesteading purposes a large tract of land in the State of Mexico and another in the State of Sonora and within the last few days have closed a deal for 300,000 acres of rich land in the Fuerte river valley of the State of Sonora. It is said to be the plan to send 12,000 Mormon families from Utah, Colorado and Nevada into Mexico. A short time ago Mormon interests secured from the Mexican government a concession covering the manufacture of beet sugar in Mexico. It is proposed to invest \$500,000 in the industry.

TWO ARE DROWNED.

BATTLE, Mont., Sept. 3.—By the overturning of their boat while merrymaking on the lake at Columbia Gardens last evening Joseph H. Murry, aged 18, of Battle, and Ernest Easthorne, aged 24, of Helena, were drowned in about ten feet of water. Two other young men, Tim Cohen and an unknown youth were precipitated into the lake, but escaped by swimming to the shore. Murry's body was dragged out of the lake with a grappling hook, while that of Easthorne was taken out by Harry Reig, who got an employe at the recreation park, who dived four times before he finally succeeded in bringing the body to the surface.
