PORTLAND, Sept. 6.—Fruit trade, on front street continues to be heavy and today's receipts from Oregon-growing points were well up to the requirements of the retail trade.

Peaches were in somewhat better receipts, and some very fine late Crawfords put in an appearance selling rapidly at \$1.10 per box. Other varieties maintain the 80¢ to 85¢ quotation.

Considerable complaint was heard on the street today about the condition in which the last lot of bananas were sent in. Dealers are unable to dictate, however, and are practically compelled to take the fruit, no difference what shape it is in.

The egg market continues quite strong and while 25 cents is quoted by most leading commission houses, there are here and there to be found firms that name 25¢ for first-class candled goods.
