Complete Market Reports Corrected Each Day Giving the Wholesale Prices of Commodities, Farm Produce and Vegetables.

PORTLAND, Sept. 7.—There continues to be somewhat of an over supply of melons on this market, though this morning's sales were very heavy, especially of watermelons, and the street, from present indications, will have disposed of the California surplus by evening. There are heavy receipts of Rogue River watermelons that are selling well at 75¢ to \$1.00 per cwt., and are giving good satisfaction to the trade. Cantaloupes are not in very good shape, some off grades moving at buyers' figures. Quotation for good cantaloupes is near \$1 one way or the other.

Tomatoes are still in pretty heavy receipt and the price has dropped to about 25¢ a box.

Onions are weaker on good supplies from the Beaverton region, where the crop is quite up to former years. Today's price is \$1.25 to \$1.50 per sack.

The egg market continues quite strong and while 25 cents is quoted by most leading commission houses, there are here and there to be found firms that name 25¢ to 26¢ for first-class candled goods. Receipts were somewhat better this morning, but the market is by no means oversupplied. Poultry remains steady with very good receipts, though a healthy demand keeps the stocks from accumulating.

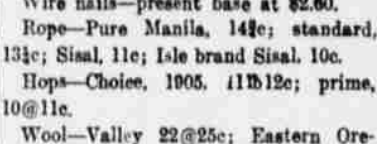

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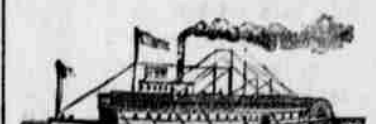

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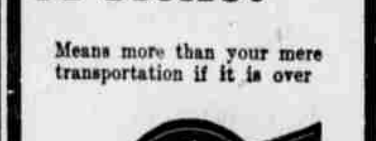
