BIG GAIN IS MADE BY A & C. R. R.

INCREASE OF 30 PER CENT SHOWN IN BUSINESS ORIGINATING ON A. & C. LINE-7,300 CARS USED IN HAULING LUMBER LAST YEAR.

Though the combined lumber business handled by the Harriman and Hill systems in Oregon for the year ending June 30, 1906, amounted to less than 28,000 cars, statements completed yesterday of the trade along the line of the Astoria & Columbia River for the same period show the lumber and its products hauled filled 7,300 cars, and all originated on less than 80 miles of road. The figures also show an increase of 1,300 cars over the same period ending June 30, 1905, and it is estimated fully 30 per cent of the cut of the mills supplying the business went by water to California points because of the shortage of cars.

While the company had 6,000 cars of lumber to its credit last year, the total could have been materially increased if cars were available. Reports today show that for September and October there are orders booked to fill 2,000 cars, but it is doubtful if more than half can be moved for the same reason. Between Goble and Seaside there are 30 mills, and they cut an average according to their respective capacities, of 40,000 feet a day each on single shifts, or in all 1,200,000 feet

There is a steady trade enjoyed by me of the mills with San Francisco and Southern California ports, which goes by water, and in the event of equipment being scarce more vessels are chartered to take care of the rail shipments shut out.
