NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, THAT the Common Council of the City of Astoria has declared its determination and intention to construct a sewer along the West side of Thirty-seventh street in Adair's Port of Upper Astoria from the North line of Duane street to the North line of Commercial street. Said sewer shall be constructed of vitrified terra cotta sewer pipe 14 inches in diameter and on the proper grade to admit of sufficient drainage, and in matters of detail said sewer shall be constructed according to the plans and specifications therefor to be prepared by the City Surveyor as hereinafter provided, and any matter of construction and drainage found necessary to make the improvement safe or substantial shall be done by the contractor whether specified or not, without extra charge.

BUY AN INTEREST.

Bay City Gas & Coke Co. Partly Controlled by New York Concern.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 11.—The Examiner today says:

Leopold Michels, president of the San Francisco Gas & Coke Co., is authority for the statement that through the New York representatives of the company, owners of the United States Gas Corporation of New York, which was controlled by the Standard Oil company, have bought an interest in the San Francisco concern. It is said the New York and San Francisco stockholders still control the company and have no intention of parting with it.

DECLARED INNOCENT.

SHERIDAN, Or., Sept. 11.—I. F. Dougherty was tried here yesterday before P. M. Churchman, Justice of the Peace, on a charge brought by A. J. Cochran, who claimed to have asked Dougherty to get him a flask of whiskey and to have tendered him 50 cents therefor. Some difficulty was had in getting a jury. R. L. Connor, of McMinnville, represented the state, and W. T. Vinton, of McMinnville, watched the case on behalf of Dougherty.

The trial was attended by a large number of spectators, and resulted in Dougherty's acquittal, the jury being out but a few minutes.

CHANGES IN SYSTEM.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 11.—The Call says today:

A big shake-up is coming in the Pacific States Telephone and Telegraph Company. General Manager Louis Glass will be succeeded by a new man and other changes will be made in the executive department of the corporation. Numerous changes are also to be made in the local telephone system, as well as in the state service, with a view of putting San Francisco on an equality with Boston and other large eastern cities.

"The contemplated changes in the telephone company are the result of the visit here of E. C. Bradley and several officials of the Bell Telephone company, who have spent the greater part of their time in looking over the local company's plant and studying plans for changes. Bradley and his associates leave for Boston, the home office of the Bell Telephone company, next week, and it is expected that the changes here will be announced shortly."
