PORTLAND, Sept. 12.—The first Brussels sprouts of the season came in from California and are priced at 8c per pound.

Bananas are due tomorrow and the trade is anxious to see a big improvement in the quality over the last lot, as nearly half of it was in mighty bad condition on arrival and spoiled on the hands of dealers. Cantaloupes, also, are not keeping up to market standard, though there are, if anything, too many good melons on hand.

Commission houses are in somewhat of a quandary concerning the outlook for butter. The starting of the rainy season will bring pastures through again, and should be the means of an increased cream supply. That, of course, will tend to keep the price from going up for the time being, so that the advance undertaken by some of the city creameries may not be maintained.

The egg market continues quite strong and while 25 cents is quoted by most leading commission houses, there are here and there to be found firms that name 25¢ to 26¢ for first-class candled goods. Receipts were somewhat better this morning, but the market is by no means oversupplied. Poultry remains steady with very good receipts, though a healthy demand keeps the stocks from accumulating.
