HOUSE OF PLEASURE.

New Astoria Theater is Almost Complete and Will Be Ready on Time.

Manager R. E. Elvers of the new Astoria Theater at the corner of Exchange and Twelfth streets, is elated with the progress that is making on this enterprise and that it will be ready for its formal opening on the night of the 29th, one week from next Saturday.

The auditorium is now entirely clear of scaffolding, the plasterers are through with their big tasks, the carpenters are entering upon the finishing work in their line, many of the doors of the house are already hung, the house is completely wired and the lighting fixtures will be attached at once, the painters will follow fast upon the heels of the carpenters, and the big fireproof curtain will soon swing over the footlights.

The seating of the house will be begun the first thing next week and the final touches will follow quickly, to the completion of the handsomest house of pleasure this city has ever known.

The opening on the night of the 29th, will be held back until the hour of 9 o'clock sharp, in order to give the business men of the city an opportunity to get to the theater in time to witness the initial scene of the beautiful comic opera which is to herald the house to its career, the "Royal Chef," of which the Lewiston press of recent date has the following happy announcement:

"The Royal Chef," introduced last night to the Temple theater the finest scenery that has ever faced its audience and with the settings were bright faced chorus girls, well trained voices and new and catchy costumes—enough to send rapture to the hearts of everyone in the crowded seats of the playhouse. "The Rajah of Oolong as handled by Oscar Ragland, was a clever bit of work. The tenor of the company is Mr. Clemenson of smart physique and stirring voice, in the part of Lieutenant Park, U. S. A. His duet with Princess Tito was greatly enjoyed. While credit is given for the display of talent, Walter Smith is entitled to a share, as the stage manager of the organization, for the well selected and exceptionally drilled chorus.

"Taken altogether, it is doubtful if another musical company has ever appeared here whose essential parts are so well balanced. So favorable has been the impression created that it is believed the audience will be even greater tonight.
