PORTLAND, Sept. 17.—Reports from the hop fields were quite favorable this morning. In most yards picking was continued over Sunday, and as the weather was generally cool Saturday and yesterday, there is every indication that little if any damage resulted from the wet spell.

In some yards poles were blown down on Friday, but to no alarming extent. Growers say better progress in finishing up picking is made since the washing of the vines, as the product is riper and can be stripped much more rapidly.

Weinhard's LAGER BEER CHANGE MANAGEMENT. Telephone System. San Francisco will receive a large share of this appropriation and all the wires will be placed under ground.

According to Pickernall, Henry T. Scott will be retained as president. He admitted that a new man would fill the position of Vice President and General Manager Louis Glass, whose successor, said Pickernall, would be an Easterner of experience, who is to come to San Francisco and give his entire attention to the service on the Pacific coast. The new manager will be appointed immediately after the return of President Fish, who is now in Europe. Mr. Fish will direct the affairs of the American Telephone & Telegraph company from Boston.

The Bell company will spend \$10,000,000, it is said, during the next year on its Pacific Coast Telegraph & Telephone System. San Francisco will receive a large share of this appropriation and all the wires will be placed under ground.

Announcement was also made of the resignation of A. J. Stice, who was assistant to General Manager Louis Glass. This position is to be abolished. G. P. Robinson has been appointed to fill the newly created position of general superintendent and E. J. Zimmer, formerly auditor of the company, has been made assistant to President Scott.
