PORTLAND, Sept. 25.—Local stocks of potatoes are somewhat better than were expected at the beginning of last week. It was then thought that farmers would continue to be slow in getting the product into market, but reports going out that a better price was in sight had the effect of starting a movement in this direction.

There is little, if any, shipping demand, an occasional car lot to the South or Northern California coast ports being about the extent of that trade.

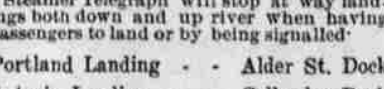
