ern ordinary humanity. New York's gambling lid is on reasonably tight, ordinarily (by which we mean that public gambling is not carried on openly), but when "Big Tim" Sullivan, the Tammany potentate, gave his annual picnic recently, which all the East Side attended, the lid shot off with a bang. As soon as the big steamboats, which were to convey the stalwart thousands to the picnic grounds, cast off their moorings, the fun began. In the captain's cabin, in one of the vessels "Big Tim" himself a few of the other big guns, sat down to a poker game at which the limit was the bright blue dome of the sky. All over the ship similar poker games started, ranging down to the diminutive five-cent contest. Various other card games and games in which considerable paraphernalia was used flourished on the decks and in the cabins. An Italian set up a table with the familiar three thimbles and pea. Queer Yiddish gambling games played with bits of string met the hunter of the bizarre in games of chance. Three police inspectors and over a dozen captains attended the picnic, but cast no damper on the sport. Indeed, it is averred that some of those members of the constabulary, in their shirt sleeves, sat about green tables during the trip and were occasionally heard to say such things as "one card, please," or "Raise you two blue ones." But this is scarcely a thing to be whispered abroad.

Is the pushcart a menace to health? is a question New York is trying to answer these days. There are 5,000 pushcart peddlers in the city and they sell everything in the way of foodstuffs as well as clothing of all kinds. Pushcarts choke the narrow streets on the East Side and certain it is that they hinder traffic and sometimes seriously delay fire apparatus rushing to a blaze in one of the tenement rookeries. Recently the Health Department made an investigation of the healthfulness of the edibles sold from the pushcarts and the department inspectors reported that over 70 per cent of the stuff vended was "good," at little being characterized as "unfit for consumption." However, the monthly periodical published by the New York Post-Graduate School and Hospital, in a recent article said: "The fruits upon the public stand of a street vender on a dusty day carry more actually harmful bacteria than a whole warehouseful of heat." This statement in a medical periodical of such high standing outweighs any cursory examination by city inspectors. The pushcart man will probably be regulated in time. Though practically all the pushcart men are foreign born, the majority of them have been in this country over five years. Many of them are rich. One, who was recently arrested for peddling without a license, swore that he could not afford a dollar fee. When he was searched \$550 in cash, two rings, three valuable gold watches and a pair of diamond earrings were found in his pockets.

FAMOUS GENERAL ILL.

Member of Sherman's Band Confined to Hospital—Poor But Cheerful.

CHICAGO, Sept. 25.—The Record-Herald today says:

Cooped up in a little ward of the Baptist Hospital with three other patients, General Edwin M. McCook, commander of the cavalry division in "The march to the sea," and for eight years governor of the territory of Colorado, is suffering the tortures of inflammatory rheumatism. Racked with pain and financially helpless, the former commander is dependent on the fraternal help which his old army comrades give, but he is far from despondent over his trials.

For six weeks the general has been confined to the hospital. He is 73 years of age, his right eye is sightless and his right arm useless, but he is still buoyed up with the indomitable courage and the fire and spirit that carried him to the head of Sherman's cavalry in the sixties.

The career of General McCook covers an important period in the history of the nation. In civic and military life, he has attained distinction and his name stands out prominently in many of the greater incidents in the country's history. General McCook is a son of Dr. John McCook, a brother of former Congressman McCook of New York and a nephew of Major Daniel McCook, who sent eight sons to the union army, three of whom were killed, while four of them attained the rank of general. Major McCook himself was killed in battle by Morgan's guerrillas. General A. M. McCook went to the civil war with an Ohio cavalry regiment that became a part of the army of the Cumberland. His gallantry in the many campaigns in which his troops were engaged carried him throughout various promotions to general's rank, and it was as commander of the cavalry forces that formed the right flank of General Sherman's army that he participated in the "march to the sea." After the war he was governor of the territory of Colorado until it became "The Centennial State" in 1876. Later he was made United States Minister to Hawaii.

adjourned meeting of the so-called Albany conference of anti-Hearst Democrats. At the meeting, which was attended by representatives from about 25 counties, it was decided that the delegates opposed to the nomination of W. R. Hearst should concentrate on Judge Gaynor or Mayor Adom as expediency may require.

At the conference, T. M. Osborne, former Mayor of Auburn, said a critical opinion confronted the Democratic party and there was danger that "the emblems and traditions which we all love are to be turned over to the Independence League. It is," he said, "the sense of the majority of those present that we should concentrate on some candidate who can be voted for by all self-respecting Democrats and who may possibly defeat this unholy alliance."

It is reported that Jerome intends securing the proxy of one of the New York county delegates and himself appear on the floor of the convention to lead the fight against Hearst.

ALL CAN USE WIRELESS.

So Decides the Institute of International Law in Session at Ghent.

GHENT, Sept. 25.—The institute of international law yesterday discussed the questions relative to aerostatics and wireless telegraphy which will be adopted at the next meeting. It was decided that the air is free in time of war and peace, and that the only control states have over the air rests entirely upon necessity of the security of the state. In default of special arrangements the relations governing ordinary telegraphy shall apply to the wireless system. Every state has the right to oppose the passage of Herzian waves over its state, by private apparatus, or from airship or balloon. In the case of one government prohibiting this wireless exchange, it must at once advise other governments of the step.

The ministry of war is negotiating for the acquisition of the famous Lebaudy dirigible balloons, as well as the second balloon which Lebaudy is now constructing.

and, tonight, there appears nothing whatever to promise relief, save full control by the United States.

Palma has called a special session of Congress for Friday, when he will present the resignation of himself and of Vice President Mendez Capote. The moderates, however, will not attend that session of Congress and at a meeting today, decided to quit forthwith, alleging they had been unjustly treated by the American commissioners.

All members of the cabinet and the heads of departments presented their resignations tonight to Palma, who accepted them.

SENATOR BAILEY ANSWERS.

Agitation by Opponents Only a Means to Deprive Him of Office.

DALLAS, Texas, Sept. 25.—Senator Joseph W. Bailey tonight issued a long statement in reply to criticisms on himself and his record. He stated that the present agitation against him was inaugurated by the same men who sought by legislation to deprive him of the senatorship, after he had won it in a fair election six years ago. He also stated that he had never performed for railroad corporations any duty that any other reputable lawyer would not have performed and declares emphatically that he has never neglected public service, that "the public service holds the highest claim upon every man who undertakes it," and that if there was any conflict between his duty to a client and his duty to the people, he had acted for the people, and that during fifteen years in Congress he had spoken and voted on every important question that has come up.

LAW LOOSELY DRAWN.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 25.—A decision has been reached by the Department of Justice that the meat inspection law as enacted by Congress, does not apply to foreign products shipped into this country.

Old Soldiers Used as Tools in Obtaining Land for Grifters.

CHICAGO, Sept. 25.—An extensive scheme of land frauds in government lands in the vicinity of Alliance, Neb., was unearthed here yesterday and Patrick J. King, for many years the head "policy" promoter of Chicago, was arrested on a charge of being the ring leader. Subornation of perjury was the specific charge on which King was arrested. He was arraigned before U. S. Commissioner Fostle and released on \$2,500 bonds until Oct. 4.

It is charged that King, with a number of other men, has used aged civil war veterans and their widows to fur-

ther the scheme of obtaining title to vast tracts of land in Nebraska. King is charged with having fraudulently obtained title to five sections of land as from as many former soldiers.
