### FELL FOUR STORIES TO HIS DEATH

**WILLIAM JACKSON, JANITOR OF ST. MARY'S HOSPITAL, KILLED BY FALL DOWN ELEVATOR SHAFT EARLY LAST EVENING.**

A very sad accident occurred at St. Mary's hospital last evening about 7 o'clock, which has cast a deep gloom over the good sisters and all others in touch with the unhappy victim of the misadventure.

William Jackson, the well known janitor of the great hospital, who has done duty there, off and on, for the past dozen years, was on the third floor of the building and, needing the elevator for some purpose, signalled the lower floors by bell for the cage to be sent up to him. His call was answered and the elevator slowly rose to his floor, but by some mischance, would not stop there and rose seven or eight feet above the point where he stood to receive it.

He at once got a chair and placed it in the opening of the elevator shaft, with the intention of climbing up into it or of hauling it back to his level, when, unhappily, the chair slipped with him and he was precipitated down the open well to the cement floor of the basement, sixty feet below. He struck upon his head and shoulders and lived but a very few moments after the awful impact.

He was entirely alone when he sought to reach the elevator on the upper floor and he was alone in the last unhappy moment of his conscious life, for it was only his last expiring groan that reached one of the passing sisters, who, noting his dreadful predicament, spread the alarm.

When the sister superior reached his side, the old man was dead and all that was left to do was to summon a physician in the person of Dr. J. A. Fulton, and send word to Father Waters, rector at St. Mary's, both of whom are rived very shortly, but too late to render the old janitor either physical or spiritual aid or comfort.

The old man was a native of Denmark, and a quiet and faithful servitor, and was well known by many who have had occasion to visit the big hospital

in past years. He was sometimes fractious, grew discontented and left the home, but his moods soon changed and he always and successfully, sought reinstatement. He was a man of sober and peaceful disposition, and went about his duties as night watchman in a careful, considerate fashion that made him valuable and reliable.

Sister Superior Tancred and her corps of sisters, nurses, physicians and all who have to do with the hospital, will deplore his unexpected and dreadful death.

The body was removed to the undertaking parlors of W. C. A. Pohl, where it will be prepared for interment, and notice of the funeral will be made later. He will, in all probability, be buried by the side of his wife, who lies in one of the local cemeteries.

#### VALUABLE PROJECT.

**Direct Rail Line From Lake Superior to The Gulf.**

CHICAGO, Oct. 5.—The Tribune today says: "It is believed the Illinois Central Railroad is back of the projected Lake Superior and Southern Railroad, which is to be built from Madison, the Central's most northern terminus, in Wisconsin, to Huron Bay. If this is the case, the Illinois Central is to have a direct line from the Gulf of Mexico to Lake Superior.

The projected line runs through a rich lumber district and Huron is closely contiguous to the iron and copper regions. There are excellent harbor facilities at Huron Bay. Oshkosh, Wis., capitalists, who are supposed to be working in harmony with the Illinois Central, have bought a large amount of

land stretching from Republic, Wis., to Huron Bay, which includes the roadbed of the old Huron Bay Railroad, already graded.

#### ANY EXCUSE WILL DO.

CHICAGO, Oct. 5.—The first effect of the troubles in Cuba on commercial interests was disclosed yesterday when every independent cigar manufacturer in the city received a circular notifying him that the price of cedar cigar boxes had been raised \$1 a hundred. The reason given is the scarcity of lumber and especially of cedar, the great bulk of which is imported from Cuba.
