Latest Quotations in the Portland Markets

Complete Market Reports Corrected Each Day Giving the Wholesale Prices of Commodities, Farm Produce and Vegetables.

PORTLAND, Oct. 6.—Poultry prices continue to drop on all lines. Two of the principal buyers of chickens for retailing are stocked up on high priced fowls, and for two days have not been in the market, even at the lower figures quoted, explaining that no further stocks are wanted until their accumulations have been disposed of. With heavy receipts for two days the demand has suddenly disappeared, leaving most of the dealers with an over-supply. There is no change in the city creamery butter situation. One lone concern still quotes an advance to 32¢ but the others hold back, and are sending out price lists at the old figure, 30¢. Country creameries fairly steady.

Larger veals drag, though there is a good sale and steady market for light weight. Prices unchanged, heavy carcasses, however, not bringing quite quoted figures. Hogs not in particularly heavy receipt today, but on more arrivals the quoted prices would probably have to be cut fractionally. There is a good healthy demand for muttons and lambs.

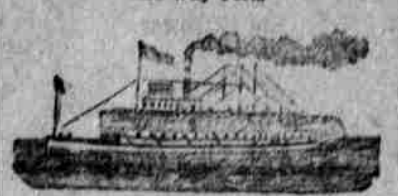
