PORTLAND, Oct. 8.—Trade on Front street with commission houses was unusually quiet this forenoon, especially among the produce houses. There was some holdover poultry, indicating an oversupply Saturday. The outlet north seems to have become clogged to some extent and, according to advices from the Sound, the retail trade is handling more than the usual quantity of refrigerated stuff.

Heavy receipts of chickens are expected this midweek and on a repetition of last week's volume of shipments prices will in all likelihood go off another fraction.

Fresh meats remain in about the same shape as to values. Prime young veals are selling promptly, while heavies are rather slow and weak. Hogs only in limited demand.
