Registration and polling precinct No.
2, in ward No. 1, shall include all that
portion of the city of Astoria lying be-
tween the East line of said precinct
No. 1, of said ward, and the center line
of 8th street in said city extended a
sufficient distance North and South to
intersect the North and South bound-
ary lines of said city and the polling
place for said precinct shall be En-
gine House No. 1, at the corner of 7th
and Commercial streets, and the judges
of election for said polling place shall
be P. J. Goodman, C. C. Utzinger and
Isaac Bergman, and the clerks thereof
shall be Paul Badolett and F. J. Car-
ney.

and South boundary lines of said city
and the polling place for said precinct
