



Consequently the fire of these vessels in chasing will be as heavy as the head or stern fire of any three foreign battleships, while on the beam it will equal that of any two other battleships.

These vessels are designed for speed of 25 knots and may attain 27 knots on their trials. They will be propelled by turbine engines. The construction of the hulls is on the same principles as adopted by the Dreadnaught, but they are less heavily armored,




