**A NEW SAW MILL
FOR ASTORIA**

NEGOTIATIONS ARE NOW GOING FORWARD THAT MAY LAND ANOTHER BIG MILL FOR ASTORIA, IF PROPERTY CAN BE SECURED.

The Central Door and Lumber company, who are operating the sash and door plant at Smith Point, are negotiating for additional ground from the Taylor estate and if this can be secured a large modern mill will be built to be operated in conjunction with the sash and door factory. The company desires to purchase about 1,000 feet of frontage alongside of their present location, and the matter is now being considered by the Taylor interests. It is the intention of the company to erect a modern mill, complete in every way and to equip it with a 10-foot band. This would be the largest band on the river as the largest now in operation is 9 feet. Big logs now have to be blasted before they can be handled, which occasions a great deal of waste and for that reason large logs which contain the most clear stuff are rejected as not desirable. For this reason the projectors of the new mill will endeavor to take care of this class of timber. J. C. Gripper, president of the company, and A. M. Hogen, the manager here, are bound to make a success of the enterprise as they are practical mill men in every way. Mr. Hogen has been connected with some of the largest mills on the coast and understands the manufacturing thoroughly. The matter now rests with the property owners.

Amendment Overlooked—In reporting the work of the Astoria charter commission in these columns yesterday, an omission was made, inadvertently, in relation to the adoption of an amendment, which is intended to aid the mayor in enforcing the laws of the city by suspending delinquent officials, filing his reasons therefor with the council and abiding the result there, which will be determined by the majority vote of the council for or against the process so employed by the mayor. As the charter now stands, the mayor is practically helpless in the enforcement of the law, and this is intended to assist him in the maintenance of administrative decorum on all sides; and is good, but would have been better had it required a two-thirds vote of the council to reinstate the offending officer.

Civil Service Business—Secretary C. T. Crosby, of the local civil service commission, announces that examinations will be held on the following dates for the following government positions, at the custom house in this city: October 17, for meat inspector, bureau of animal industry; October 30-31, topographer and cartographic draughtsman; November 1, special examiners and agents, bureau of corporations; November 2, instrument maker; November 7-8, topographic draughtsman; November 14, aid in zoology; interpreter (Syrian and Rutheman); teacher male, Indian service; farmer with knowledge of irrigation.

Good Time Coming—It is said that there are over seventy-five aspiring neophytes awaiting inoculation into the mysteries of the Foresters of America on next Wednesday night, and Astoria Court No. 8 is due to entertain a big group of Grand Court officers who will hark down from Portland to assist in the sacrifice of these quaking candidates; but all the same, a real jolly time is expected at that time and place.

One More Session—There will be one more session of the charter commission, on next Wednesday night at the city hall for the purpose of reading and adopting the proposed amendments to the charter, as a whole, and referring them for proper compilation and due publication, to the judiciary committee. In the meantime, the common council, at its session tomorrow night, will be asked to appropriate a sufficient sum to pay for the publication of the proposed changes in the basic law of the municipality.

**CLATSOP'S TAX ROLL
FOR YEAR 1905**

SHERIFF REPORTS UPON CONDITION AND SHOWS ROLL TO BE WITHIN FEW THOUSANDS OF TREASURY ABSORPTION.

Sheriff M. R. Pomeroy and his able deputies have finished their report upon the tax collections upon the roll of 1905, and the same shows the following actualities in the final balance:

The foregoing statement indicates that the roll for collection now being closed up is over \$25,000 in excess of that of last year, while the delinquencies now standing at \$3,782.31, are but little over half what they were last year; all of which goes to show that the tax affairs are in creditable shape and in equally creditable hands. The statutory penalties and interest will now be imposed upon all collections and in due season the property unpaid will go to the highest bidder at public sale.
