PORTLAND, Oct. 17.—Trade on Front Street was unusually dull this forenoon. Commission houses as a rule were practically idle, and apart from some movement in poultry and fresh produce there was little doing.

Prices remain at about the same figures quoted for the past few days, with receipts keeping up pretty well. Most sales in a small way are made at 3 1/2c, and a few houses report 3 1/2c. The average, however, on large lots is about 3 1/2c.

Too many large-size veals came in, and the price was not so much an object as disposal of the carcasses. There is a pretty good demand for smaller veals, but heavies are hard to move. There could be quite a lot more light hogs handled, but heavies are slow. Mutton and lambs are in great demand.


