PORTLAND, Oct. 22.—The wholesale merchants were notified today by the Union Meat company of a change in the prices covering hams, bacon, sausage and lard, and that the half cent advance made yesterday would continue. Several hop raisers are still holding out to their crop, with the belief that owing to a scarcity in the east, the demand will increase and the prices increase accordingly. With this exception there is no change in the local market situation today.
