STONED TO DEATH LAND FRAUD CASES

A Despicable Murder of a Prominent Illinois Farmer.

VICTIM OF WHITECAPPED

Coroner's Jury Investigate the Case and Return a Verdict in Accordance With the Facts Produced.

CHICAGO, Oct. 25.—A dispatch to the Tribune from Red Bud, Ill., says: Anton Millibach, a German farmer, residing at Renault, Monroe county, Ill., was white-capped last Tuesday night and died on Friday night. Millibach went to town on Tuesday and became slightly intoxicated. A gang surrounded him in a saloon and threatened to hang him. He resisted, but was overpowered. Then the lights were put out and he was beaten and thrown out. Millibach went back to his wagon and started home. Part of the gang was waiting for him at the outskirts of the village. They showered him with stones. He fell from his wagon and was taken home by a bartender. A coroner's jury yesterday brought in a verdict that Millibach came to his death from injuries received from unknown persons. Millibach left a widow and five children.

SHOT HIS WIFE.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 25.—William Johnson, a foreman for the Watson-Redding Construction Company, shot and fatally wounded his wife last night on Montgomery street, near Pacific. The shooting arose out of the woman's refusal to return to her husband, whom she had left to earn her own living as a waitress. Johnson was arrested and the woman was taken to the hospital, where it was found that a bullet was imbedded near her heart. She has identified Johnson as her assailant.

Delayed By the Absence of Judge Wolverton in Frisco.

TRYING INSURANCE CASES

Judge Hunt Also Assisting in Place of Judge Morrow Who is Convalescing from Recent Illness.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 25.—Judge Charles E. Wolverton of the United States District Court of Oregon, who came to this city a short time ago to try the insurance cases now pending in the United States district court, is now dividing his time between the insurance cases and the duties of Judge Morrow on the bench of the United States circuit court. This change has been made necessary by the retirement of Judge Hawley and the consequent rearrangement of the work between Judge Hunt and Judge Wolverton, both of whom are in San Francisco to relieve Judge Morrow, while he is convalescent from an affliction of the eyes.

The sickness of Judge Morrow had a serious effect upon the Oregon Land Fraud cases, as it took Judge Wolverton from his place upon the bench of the Oregon court, and at the same time took Judge Hunt away from his task of hearing land fraud cases in Portland. It is expected that Judge Wolverton will be able to return to Portland by the first of December, but it will be early next year before Judge Hunt can return. Consequently no land fraud cases will be tried before next year.

BOYS IN BLUE.

President Roosevelt Initiated Into the Grand Army.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25.—In the Blue Room of the White House today, President Roosevelt was initiated as a member of the Associate Society of Farnsworth Post, G. A. R., of Mount Vernon, New York, an organization of business men who took no part in the war, but sympathized with the cause of the union. General Horace Porter presided at the installation ceremony, which was attended by many members of the Mount Vernon society.

CHARGED WITH MANSLAUGHTER.

BAKER CITY, Oct. 25.—Charges of manslaughter have been preferred against Dr. Roy Fuller of Eagle Valley who has been here in the county jail for several days on a charge of practicing medicine without a license. It is alleged that Fuller performed a criminal operation upon Mrs. David S. Glover, who died as a result of the operation. The dead woman was the bride of a month at the time of her demise.

COAL MEN INDICTED.

OMAHA, Oct. 25.—The grand jury today return 57 indictments against the members of the Omaha Coal Exchange, charging them with violation of the anti-trust laws.
