

ST. LOUIS DOCTORS VENT VIEWS

**DIFFERENT OPINIONS PREVAIL ON
COOPER'S REMARKABLE SUCCESS
—SOME CREDIT HIM AND OTHERS
CALL HIM A FAD.**

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 25.—The astonishing sale of Cooper's preparations in this city has now reached such immense figures that the medical fraternity at large have become forced into open discussion of the man and his preparations.

The physicians as a whole seem to be divided with regards to the young man's success in St. Louis—some being willing to credit him for what he has accomplished, while others assert that the interest he has aroused is but a passing fad which cannot last, and which will die out as quickly as it has sprung up.

The opinion of these two factions is very well voiced in the statements made recently by two of a number of physicians who were interviewed on the subject.

Dr. J. E. Carass, when questioned about the matter, said: "I have not been a believer in proprietary preparations heretofore, nor can I say that I believe in them at present. But I must admit that some of the facts recently brought to my notice concerning this man Cooper, have gone far towards removing the prejudice I had formed against him when the unheard of demand for the preparations first sprang up in this city.

"Sooner or later the people are bound to regain their senses, and will then realize that a reputable physician is the one to whom their health had best be entrusted."

In the meantime Cooper meets several thousand people daily and only smiles when statements of the above character are quoted to him. His charitable work still continues to be very extensive.

AWAITING FINAL DECISION.

Governor Higgins Refuses to Interfere in Patrick Case.

NEW YORK, Oct. 25.—Governor Higgins will take no further action in the case of Albert Patrick, convicted of the murder of Millionaire Rice, either by way of hearing, appointment of a medical commission or anything else, until after the federal court has rendered a final decision. Announcement to this effect was made yesterday by Dr. Clark Bell, president of the Medico-Legal Society. Members of the society interested in the scientific phases of the case had presented a petition asking for the appointment of a medical commission.

Dr. Bell asks that action be suspended by friends of the movement.

GRAIN SHIPMENTS.

Railroads Refuse to Grant Concessions to Steamships.

NEW YORK, Oct. 25.—The special committee on steamships and grain interests appointed to secure from the railroads some modification of their attitude in the grain question, has had a number of meetings with trunk line people, but have not been successful. The railroads are still refusing to take new shipments of grain and many exporters who have committed themselves to definite shipments are unable to make such shipments and are thus suffering severe losses. Many of the receivers are employing the best legal talent possible and fighting the railroads to a standstill.

COLORADO SOUTHERN.

To Be Controlled by the Union Pacific System.

NEW YORK, Oct. 25.—The Tribune says reports were current in financial circles yesterday that control of the Colorado Southern Railroad was soon to pass to the Union Pacific and Rock Island, which would hold it jointly. It has been frequently rumored that the Rock Island was to take over the Colorado & Southern, but the story of joint control has not been previously heard. The trade relations of the roads named are not close and friendly.

WILL DECLARE STRIKE.

Railroad Companies Given Two Weeks to Consider Demands.

Chicago, Oct. 25.—Every railroad in the country on which members of the switchmen's union are employed, received notice today from that organization, a demand for increased wages and an eight-hour day. With the demand was also presented a notification that unless satisfactory terms could be reached, a strike vote would be taken by the union within two weeks.
