DESTROYING ARMS

Obsolete Guns and Munitions Thrown into the River.

HAVANA, Oct. 26.—Carrying out further the policy under which arms surrendered by the insurgents have been destroyed, orders have been given that a great quantity of arms, the accumulation of forty years, now stored in the casemates of Morro Castle, be thrown into the sea.

The work is being done by the garrison, under the supervision of American officers. Most of the guns are of obsolete pattern. About 1,000 stands of arms are to be rendered useless. It is intended to do away with similar accumulations of arms in other fortresses.

This destruction of weapons is a precautionary measure.

RING TO IT

PETER IREDALE

SUPPLEMENTING ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION FILED BY ASTORIA & COLUMBIA RIVER R. R. CO. YESTERDAY COVERING BRANCHES.

That the recent announcement made from Portland of the projected extension and branches of the Astoria & Columbia River Railroad Company is genuine, is borne out by the filing yesterday with County Clerk J. C. Clinton of this county, of supplementary articles of incorporation.

These projects and signed by Messrs. G. W. Talbot, Charles F. Beebe, G. C. Fulton and F. D. Kaestner, representing four-fifths of the directors of that railway.

Following are the lines, points of departure and termini of the several routes as set forth in the instrument alluded to:

In Tillamook county, Oregon: "Also a branch beginning at some point in Tillamook bay, Tillamook county, Oregon, running thence in a southerly direction to some point on Yaquina bay, Lincoln county, Oregon."

"Also a branch, beginning at or near the mouth of the Nehalem river in Tillamook county, Oregon, running thence to and along the north fork of said Nehalem river in a northerly direction, to Seaside, Clatsop county, Oregon."

"Also a branch beginning at or near Nehalem City, in Tillamook county, Oregon, running thence in a southerly direction along Foley and Miami creeks, in Tillamook county, Oregon, to some point on Tillamook bay."

"From, at or near, the mouth of the Nehalem river, in Tillamook county, Oregon, to the mouth of Salmonberry creek; thence along Salmonberry creek to the source of said creek in Washington county, Oregon."

Visitors to the Wreck—There are many people all about this section who are bound to see the great dismantled wreck of the bark Peter Iredale, as she lies stranded on Clatsop beach, and as the sight is easy of access by train and team, hundreds are going there daily.

The Astoria & Columbia River railroad intends to send a train out on Sunday morning next in this behalf, debarking the crowds at a point next nearest to the ship, leaving Astoria at 8:15 in the morning and picking them up on the 5:15 in the evening. It will be a decided treat to many who have never witnessed such a spectacle.

Vice Consul P. L. Cherry immediately notified Lloyds' of the affair and a representative will arrive in Astoria today to investigate the matter.

On account of the looters being residents of the county, there is a disposition on the part of representatives of the vessel to treat the matter as a matter of voluntary salvage, provided the persons who now have the stolen property in their possession will return it to the captain or to Mr. Cherry, in which event investigation will be stopped and no criminal action taken.

Otherwise warrants for the arrest of all persons will be issued from the United States court, which means a term in the penitentiary for all persons implicated.

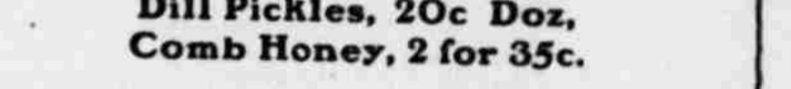
