Fleets Beginning to Move After the Recent Gales.

S. S. TERJE VEKEN ARRIVES

British Bark Bankburn Enters Port—Strathnairn in from San Francisco—Three Steamers Due from Lower Coast.

The British steamship Strathnairn has arrived in from the California coast and went on to the metropolis without any delay here.

The towing steamer Oklahoma arrived down from Portland yesterday morning with the schooner Annie Larson, lumber laden for San Francisco.

The British steamship Wyneric left out for China yesterday morning on the flood.

The Barracouta left the O. R. & N. docks yesterday morning at 9 o'clock. San Francisco bound. She took on board here 700 tons of freight.

The steamship Costa Rica is due down from Portland this morning en route to the Bay City.

The steamship Roanoke is billed to leave the Callender pier at 8 o'clock this morning for Eureka, San Francisco and Los Angeles.

The oil tanker Roderick Dhu left the lower harbor yesterday morning for the Bay City, on the lines of the tug Dauntless.

The Norwegian steamship Terje Viken, from San Francisco, arrived in at 10 o'clock yesterday morning, in ballast for Portland, whence she will load lumber out for Nagasaki.

The fine British bark Bankburn came in yesterday morning from Hamburg, cement laden for Portland. Captain Moore states that he has been off the mouth of the river since last Wednesday. He had an uneventful trip around, save for some nasty weather off the Horn.

That the owners and agents of the wrecked bark Peter Iredale believe that the vessel is susceptible of being saved is vouched for by the presence of their advertisement in this issue of the Astorian, and which appears simultaneously in a dozen other important marine sheets on the coast, calling for bids for floating her and delivering her in safety in this or some other good port.

Word was received at the office of the British Vice Consul here yesterday morning, from Captain Lawrence, of the bark Iredale, that the valuables taken from that vessel on Thursday night, are all to be returned to him and the matter of the prosecutions will fall to the ground when this is done.

Candidates Scarce—Yesterday was the last day to file petitions for city offices to be voted for at the election on Wednesday, December 8. Only two petitions were filed, John C. McCue and Chas. H. The only fight at the primaries will be between John C. McCue and Chas. H. Abercrombie for city attorney.
