FRIENDLY RELATIONS.

Good Feeling Exists Between United States and Italy.

NEW YORK, Nov. 16.—Henry White, United States ambassador to Italy, arrived on the Kaiser Wilhelm III yesterday on a short visit to his family after an absence of several years.

In an interview Ambassador White said the relations between Italy and the United States were of the most friendly nature. "I have read the articles concerning the proposed excavation of Herculaneum with great interest," he said. "I hope it is true that the kings of Italy, England and Germany have promised their support to Professor Wadstein in his great undertaking. I am sure that the excavations would result in the discovery of numberless treasures of great artistic value."

Mr. White said he had no business to transact in the United States, except to see the President and spend a few days with relatives.

RAILROAD TACTICS.

SEATTLE, Nov. 16.—Federal Judge C. H. Hanford for the district of Western Washington yesterday ordered the second amended bill of complaint stricken in the case of the Co-

lumbia Valley Railway Company (a Harriman holding against the Portland & Seattle Railway (a Hill property). The Harriman road is seeking to enjoin the Hill line from building on the north bank of the Columbia river, across the right of way to which it claims title.

ENGLISH TEACHERS.

NEW YORK, Nov. 16.—After two days' inspection, the English teachers who came here to study our methods of education have discovered several good ideas which they intend to suggest to the authorities in England. THREE LIVES LOST.

Several Tenement Houses Occupied by Negroes Destroyed.

NEW YORK, Nov. 16.—Three lives were lost in New Brunswick, N. J., yesterday as a result of a fire which destroyed several tenements occupied by negroes. Two children, Frank and Susan Doran, who had been locked in their home by their parents, were burned to death. It is believed they started the fire while playing with matches. William Seng, a business man with interests in the vicinity where the fire occurred, ran to the scene and soon after died of heart disease, brought on by his exertion.

FORSAKE OLD CUSTOM

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 16.—The Merchants Association has issued a circular letter to its members suggesting that hereafter balances between business firms be settled by the mailing of checks when bills are due, and that the "Steamer day" system of having two collection days per month, a custom originating before the building of transcontinental railroads be abolished.

ACADEMY CLOSED.

ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 16.—At a late hour last night General Rudiger,

minister of war, issued an order closing the military academy of medicine. This step is taken on account of the revolutionary agitation going on within the academy.

SHORT IN ACCOUNTS.

J. E. Hutchinson of Cotton Company Shy About \$70,000.

MEMPHIS, Nov. 16.—J. E. Hutchinson, second vice president of the Delta Cotton company, admitted to members of the firm and the police, that he is short in his accounts approximately \$70,000. The shortage is said to have covered a period of ten years. Hutchinson attempted to commit suicide.
