PORTLAND, Nov. 17.—The high water has not materially interfered with the produce trade. Farmers brought in very little produce today. Eggs continue steady, butter unchanged. Chickens sold rapidly at 12 cents per pound. There is no change in the hop market, but it is thought prices will advance somewhat, but not reach the prices paid last year.
