Twenty Second Annual Event Ushered in Yesterday.

GREATEST EQUINE EXHIBIT

Horsemen Have Been Interested in the National Horse Show for Many Years, and This Year Will Eclipse Former Ones.

NEW YORK, Nov. 19.—Promptly at 9 o'clock this morning the bugle will announce the formal opening of the 22nd annual event of the National Horse Association at Madison Square Garden. The show of horses this year, it is said, will in some respects be the greatest equine exhibit ever given in New York. Nearly all of the former show ring champions will be shown and their number will be augmented by the arrivals which will distinguish themselves in more than one exhibition. In former years the new arrivals have been for competition in regular classes only, but this week the public will have a chance to see many new championship classes, in all of which the keenest competition is assured.

Horsemen who have been interested in the national horse show for many years were of the opinion yesterday that larger numbers and better quality would be shown this week than in any in the last dozen years. As usual there is the keenest interest in the "dress parade" which is considered one of the chief features of the show. Francis Murphy, the orator at the preliminary luncheon inspection at Madison Square Garden, voiced this interest when he said in describing the horse show that it was "A sprinkling of aristocrats and a quantity of good clothes and some horses." Society has come to town and prepared for the show and visitors will see many stunning gowns before the week is over.

- 10:30 a. m.—Preliminary trial of 29 saddle horses, class 73.
- 11 a. m.—Judging 49 hunters and jumpers, class 109.

ASTORIA CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

FIRST SESSION IN SEVERAL WEEKS—BIG ACCUMULATION OF CORRESPONDENCE—IMPORTANT RESOLUTIONS.

After several weeks of "innocuous desuetude," the Astoria chamber of commerce held a formal and fairly well attended session last night at the Bond street rooms, when Judge J. Q. A. Bowlby presided in the absence of President Morse and C. R. Higgins manipulated the books and documents as usual.

Secretary Higgins presented a stiff assortment of accumulated documents from various sources, mostly kindred associations and on numerous topics, mostly in relation to pending conventions and state and national enterprises, all of which were carefully reviewed and sent into committee where they will be duly considered and reported upon.

Judge Bowlby laid especial emphasis on the necessity for an appropriation from Congress in behalf of the erection and maintenance of a monument to definitely mark the site of old Fort Clatsop and the headquarters of the great explorers, Lewis and Clark, and at his instance, the chamber passed a resolution asking for an appropriation of \$20,000 in this relation, and this with the conviction that Senator C. W. Fulton will make a stand for it at the proper sources at Washington. It is held by the chamber to be not unreasonable to expect this concession in view of the fact that the last session of Congress saw the successful issue of the prayer of the Jamestown people for a similar allotment for a monument to mark the identical spot on which the forefathers of the nation landed at that famous old town.

The matter of the improvements for the harbor of Astoria was also taken up and discussed very freely, and Chairman Bowlby reported that he and Judge F. J. Taylor had recently called in person upon Colonel Rossler in Portland, and had had a long talk with him on this vital subject, and that the engineer's theory as they deduced it, is, that there is no immediate need for improvement in the harbor here, except below Smith's Point, all of which territory will be included in whatever appropriation shall be made under the caption of "Portland to the Sea" the colonel saying among other things, that it was no part of the government's duty to make excavations or do any dredging in and about docks, that that was the business of the owners of the berthing privileges. Messrs. Taylor and Bowlby were quite satisfied with their interview with Colonel Rossler, and that he was doing what he could in this behalf, and basing their ideas on what he had admitted in this relation, they had drawn a resolution as coming from the chamber of commerce, and this had been submitted, approved and forwarded to the proper authorities at the national capital, and they hoped for tangible results in time.

A number of letters, calling for the appointment of delegates to certain important conventions, near and far, were referred to the chairman for his selection of delegates in each particular instance and these will be reported in due course.

The chamber then adjourned until the meeting in course.
